Ariel was one of eight CGSC - Opti racers who competed in the 2001 Opti National Championship Regatta in Barrington, Rhode Island. She qualified there for the opportunity to compete in the 2002 Trials. So, she was on with the CGSC Team for Team Sailing Nationals in Clearwater, FL. in August with a 5th Overall. She has now sailed to qualify for 2003 Team

As she has developed her sailing skills, she competed in Opti Red and Blue Fleets at the club and around the country. Last summer she sailed in the Metedeconk River Yacht Club's – Junior Powder Puff Regatta in New Jersey, coming home with a Third Place in Blue Fleet and 4th Place Overall at the Finish. Today, she crews on a one-design Lightning in BBYRA races.

ANNUAL CRUISING REGATTA

On October 5th we ran our **Annual Cruising Regatta** and had 37 boats competing. A long and short windward/leeward course (#5) was set up at 1.0nm and .75nm, but the first warning was delayed waiting for the breeze to fill in. The breeze started out of the Northeast (015) at 5 knots on the way out to the course and then faded away. The wind swung around to the Southeast (120) and long enough to get the part of the first race started before dying completely. The first 3 fleets had to be called back and the race abandoned. After half an hour of drifting around the starting line the breeze filled in again from the North (010) and held long enough to get all the fleets started.

As the PHRF 1 boats made it back down from the top mark, what little wind there was went right (070). We set a new top mark at .62nm and signaled the change of course. The wind held this direction long enough to finish the first race, but continued the right swing to Southeast (105) for the second race. The ARF fleet went around the "V" mark and back finishing their first race just behind the PHRF 4 boats. The second race was a short ..62nm course up and down twice. The wind vacillated constantly but came back to the original heading and the races were finished by 4:30pm.

Back at the club, we waited the mandatory hour to see if any of the protests discussed on the water would come to fruition. None did. Unfortunately, an operator error caused some chaos for the awards presentation and the game of "Musical Chairs" with the prizes ensued. Thankfully, Cindy Saunders came to the rescue and straighten things out. The results are posted on the BBYRA website as corrected.

I would like to thank the RC *Volunteers* for their outstanding efforts in setting up and running a series of races where the breeze was just not cooperating. Rob Quinlivan, Linda Will, Ron & Dottie Rostorfer, Marvin Schenker, Vicki Rosenbloom, Jeanne Bunten, Andrea Stringos, Chip Burr, and JoAnn Pszeny made up an impressive team. Thanks again. The sailors have all expressed their thanks for a great day on the water.

Augie Diaz wins the Snipe Western Hemispheres for a <u>2nd time!</u>



THE TONNAGE RULE



Oh! The Tonnage Rule. Many sailors have not even heard of it. It's the rule that could keep many a sail boater alive. The rule goes something like this. "Them's with the most tonnage has the right of way." No, I didn't say that sailboats have the right of way. That means that the bigger the ship, the more right of way, or clearance she should be given.

Somewhere, in most sailing classes the impression is given that boats under sail have less control and therefore should be given the right of way. You'll

never hear a good instructor say it, or even imply it! There is, however this feeling of power when you're sailing a wind driven craft.

Unless you have tried to control a heavy vessel it is hard to realize how difficult it is to change course or come to a stop. Contrary to what you might have heard, I believe that even the Coast Guard indicates that "sailboats have the right of way." So imagine this, you finally wake up and notice that this large vessel is bearing down on you in a narrow channel, which she cannot leave. The collision could give your boat a few scratches or even a hole. No one is hurt, so you can consider yourself lucky.

Now envision this "this larger vessel which does not have the right of way hits your boat amidships and cuts your boat in half. How long will you stay afloat? Most boats, when divided evenly will not stay afloat for very long. Let us <u>not</u> forget Skipper that your job is that none of the crew gets hurt.

Imagine that you are in the middle of the Gulf Stream, catching a few winks 'cause it's dark out, and this freighter cuts you in half. You were saving the batteries and were too small for him to see. I've heard several stories of freighters with sailboat rigs hung on their anchor.

Let us all give a sharp look-out and live long and healthy lives.

Island and it started a rush the next weekend of people coming over to buy their Lot.


