Second in the 175 boat team qualifiers held April 28th through May 2nd at the Coral Reef Yacht Club, he has been invited to compete in the 2004 Optimist World Sailing Championship as part of the Optimist World Team. Considered the Super Bowl of regattas in the youth sailing world, the competition will be held July 14th through July 25th, 2004 in Salinas, Ecuador, at Santa Elena Bay, near the Salinas Yacht Club.

A celebration/fundraising party was held at CGSC on May 15 in honor of Nick. We had a great turnout for the celebration with guest attending from CGSC, Lauderdale Yacht club, Miami Yacht Club, Coral Reef yacht club and Sarasota Yacht club. The Commodore Budd Price, Coach Patrick Downey, sailing buddy David Hernandez and Nick's mom Kay Voss all spoke of Nick's accomplishments and Nick's many years of sailing at CGSC. Nick then thanked everyone for all of their support over the years.

Congratulations to Captain Joe Logan, American Sailing Association's "Instructor of the Year" for 2003! He was awarded this honor during a dinner hosted by ASA at the Miami Boat Show Strictly Sail event this past February.

Joe Logan was born in Miami in 1968 and has been a member of CGSC since 1979. At the age of 11, Joe joined the club when his single mother, Sandy Logan (member) decided that youth sailing would be a positive influence on her children.

Joe and his sister, Kim Logan

(member) excelled at the CGSC junior sailing program. Joe qualified for the 1982 & 1983 Optimist World Championships in Italy and Brazil,



respectively, and later graduated to competitive double handed boats such as the Laser II, 420, and 470. . Twice, he won the Orange Bowl Regatta sailing with former members, Jim Weber, Jr. and William Bonilla. Joe, crewing for Jim Weber, continued on to become the National Champion in 420's. Finally, Joe went on to the 420 World Championships in Annapolis and Australia. During Joe's high school years, he raced & campaigned his J-24 on Biscayne Bay and Mid Winter Regattas held annually, often skipping school to compete.

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

It has been a trying year with many worries and many problems to solve. As a group we have dealt with the worries in the right way and solved the problems. I am proud to have been a part of it.



First Archimedes Club Boat Building Weekend

On July 23-25, 2004 the *Archimedes Club* organization in association with *Wooden Boat* magazine will hold its **First Archimedes Club Family Boat Building Weekend** hosted by the Coconut Grove Sailing Club. This activity is open to the public.

A central activity during the event will be the building of wooden rowboats by teams of family and friends, representing diverse backgrounds throughout our community.

The rowboats, called Bevin's Skiffs, were designed by the Alexandria Seaport Foundation to be especially suited for a family and community group with no knowledge of boat building or even carpentry skills. The boat building teams will be guided through the process by Naval Architects and experienced about builders who will ensure that teams are making progress while observing rules and gaining experience and know how.

The families will be selected through an application form supported by an essay which would describe their interest and why they should be selected to participate in the event. Upon selection they will form teams who will build their own wooded rowboats during the weekend and compete in a rowing competition upon completion of the boat construction towards the middle of the second day. Under the theme *Diversity in Unity* the events organizers extend their invitation to underprivileged families from the City of Miami to join free of charge the teams and enjoy the experience.

Each boat will be sponsored by a nationality, which in addition to providing the necessary funding, will provide representative food and cultural symbols for the benefit of the audiences.

It is the intention of the organizers that this event will become the coner stone of an annual event during which different families from our diverse community will build boats and donate them to other communities around the State of Florida who otherwise will not be able to afford the luxury of enjoying boating, thus creating



a cultural and moral links among these communities.

We are currently looking for volunteers to assist in organizing the event through one of the following six committees: Technical, Public Relations & Marketing, Fund Raising, Site Support Services and Event Management. Green Fleet



HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS

Friends, as Jimmy Buffet sings: "you can't reason with hurricane season". It'll be here soon, roughly June thru November, and good seamanship necessitates preparation. Here are some short and sweet assumptions and suggestions for saving us all a lot of trouble, including higher insurance fees.

Assumptions:

1) The CGSC moorings are NOT hurricane safe, nor is any facility directly on the waterfront from Texas to Maine. PLEASE LET'S NOT KID OURSELVES. Many boats will drag their moorings if a hurricane strikes with storm surge greater than about four feet above mean high tide.

2) Dragging boats usually get damaged, damage other boats, often go ashore and can jump the seawall anywhere in the Dinner Key Yacht Basin into streets and buildings. Such happenings are a matter of record; the damage and expense are awful and should be avoided if possible.

Suggestions - Do not wait to prepare:

1) Keep fuel tank full and clean of water and sediment, fuel filters clean, and run engine weekly.

2) Keep bottom and propeller clean.

3) Get an understanding beforehand with at least one friend (they will probably be friends for life afterward) to help you. This often requires food and beverages, and maybe even bribes; however, please do not get CGSC employees involved in this as they already have "plenty hurricane duties".

4) Select and be prepared to move or have your boat moved to a safer place before or ASAP after a Hurricane Watch or Warning

is announced by NOAH. Examples: 1st choice -west of Star Island: 3 bridges N of CGSC: Rickenbacker, Dodge Island, McArthur, then right past the MYC to the Flagler Memorial and right. 2nd choice - Marine Stadium: Thru Rickenbacker and right to far end. More choices are the Coral Gables Waterway and the Miami River.

5) Use three anchors from the bow, with chafing gear (hose) secured. Place the largest toward where the strongest wind may come from: probably E or S, and the other two 120 degrees on each side with 10:1 scope. It pays to travel in small groups as extra hands and a dinghy are helpful. Carry a celfone and have a ride home.

6) Remove dodgers, biminis, hooches, sails and dorades. Lower boom and secure wheel/tiller 45 degrees off center.

7) It's a motor trip, so check packing flange for drip and fix, pump bilge, check head, close thru-hulls, turn power off and lock boat.8) Check boat often in succeeding days and notify others that their boats are O.K.

Real Hurricane Safe advocates also memorize the CGSC "Hurricane Chant": June - too soon; July - stand by; August - a must; September - most ever: October - not over; November - remember. Yep, I'm told that praying helps too, and maybe incantations also. Good luck and please contact me about any of this if you care to. "All for one, one for all".

Any car that does not have a valid CGSC parking decal will be towed at the owners' expense. The towing company is Absolute Towing & Recovery - (305) 665-4000.


The club will no longer accept keys from members to move their cars if they can not find a spot and double park their cars. These cars will also be towed at the owner's expense.

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
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
