More importantly, compared to my past digs on the storm-ravaged Gulf Coast, Miami looks pretty darn good everyday!

A big part of my Miami experience has been my affiliation with the Coconut Grove Sailing Club. After 60 plus years, I think the members have the sailing part down pretty well. A good deal of my concern as your manager is to upgrade the social side of the club through banquet / catering sales and the overall food and beverage experience of the members. This will be a slow, but steady growth process., but very do-able.

Some members may fear that my background in "Yacht" clubs will transcend the relaxed casual air of CGSC to one of highbrow, white glove service and higher prices. This is

not my desire or goal. My only goal is to create a more fun, user-friendly facility, hoping to increase member usage. More usage creates higher revenues - not higher prices.

Does that mean I'll never raise a price? (Ask that same question to a gas station owner.)

Prices will always reflect the current market. I'm charged to work within and produce prescribed "revenue and cost" limits. I do not solicit or collect any type of bonus for increased revenues.

So as the kid selling magazine subscriptions at your door says "Won't you please help me make my quota?" (Geeez, to be 13 again) I need you to again make CGSC your home on the water. Stop in for lunch or dinner or enjoy a cocktail on the deck during a sunset. If you see a way to make things better, let me know. I always welcome another pair of eyes. If we can change or correct a problem - we will. Hope to see you soon,

"Hugh's Q & A"

Many questions asked are composites from several members. Please direct questions or issues directly to myself or use the "Suggestion Box" located in the club lounge.

Q: I hear the FI. legislators have approved pets in restaurants. Why doesn't CGSC comply? A: We do! The law allows pets only in sidewalk venues (we have a deck). Further, stringent health code requirements must be followed that would overall increase food cost to our members which we do not feel justifiable at this time. Finally, each venue has the obligation to its guest or members to determine if the allowance of pets in their eating establishment might be detrimental to others. In our case, several members have expressed their personal health concerns. As a compromise, the downstairs has been established as a "Pet Friendly" zone, provided your pet remains on a leash at all times and the pet owner "pick up" after Fiddo.

Q: I have a moored boat and maintain the required 300K-liability coverage. Why does the club insist on being listed as a "Additionally Insured?" A: That's a fair question. After last year's storms, many folks have found it difficult to obtain insurance and when they do, are hesitant to request further, that CGSC be listed as an Additionally Insured party. However, as a Additionally Insured party on your policy, CGSC will simply be notified directly in the event your coverage changes or is suspended. There is no additional cost to you. We have personally contacted several agencies and they have provided this on the behalf of the member to us.

Q: What's the deal with parking on the lot, I'm a member and constantly told my car may be towed?

A: We have approximately 400 regular and lifetime members and about 600 social members. Unfortunately, we only have spaces for about 50 vehicles. Parking on the lot is a privilege of only the regular and lifetime members. But further, it's not the individual, it's the vehicle. In order to park on the lot you must first be a regular or lifetime member. Secondly, you must display a CGSC parking decal (available from the club office) and finally understand that those individuals with a decal, park on a first come. first served basis. Double parking is not allowed.

Q: Social Night use to be free, then \$2.00 now it's \$4.00. What's the deal? Why do we pay anything? A: There is a misconception in the private club world that dues cover all cost. Unfortunately they do not. It is my understanding that Social Night originally was worked through individual volunteers. They were given a stipend to bring in pizza, sandwich platters, etc. It was hoped that members would come and enjoy a few cocktails and camaraderie. The Board struggled each week trying to recruit a member host, cover the cost and keep the guest happy. This was unsuccessful and it was decided the club kitchen would prepare a weekly meal and members would pay \$2.00. On reviewing this, I discovered the club was losing money weekly, hence the increase to \$4.00. We are not trying to make a profit on this event - just break even. I have to think that you'd agree Sonya puts out a pretty good one dish meal and salad for \$4.00.

VIVA LOS ROQUES!

The twin prop tourist flight from Caracas touched down, and we were there! El Gran Roque is the only settlement in the Los Roques archipelago, a national park 80 miles off the coast of Venezuela in the Caribbean. These islands, together with Las Aves to the west are a remote, seldom cruised, but beautiful part of the Caribbean.

We were there to sail with our friends Ken and Anne on their MacGregor. It proved to be excellent tradewind sailing – 15 to 25 knots downwind in warm, dry and sunny conditions. Except for the hills of Gran Roque, the islands are low lying with beautiful sandy beaches and excellent snorkeling amid lots of coral.

Over the following ten days, we made our way westward. Anchorages were plentiful, but care had to be taken with coral and shoals protecting the entrance to most of them. The charts and even the cruising guides could not be relied upon exactly in terms of latitudes and longitudes. We soon became comfortable reading the water and working our way in and out. We saw only a few other cruising sailboats throughout Los Roques and Las Aves. If there were two other boats in the anchorage, it was crowded! Frequently, we were the lone boat.

Our stops included Sarqui on Isla Crasqui, and then west to Cayo de Agua where early sailors found much needed water. The beach there is beautiful. From the anchorage we could see the small lighthouse on West Cay, the end of the archipelago. Then, it was 30 miles of downwind sailing under main and genoa in 20+ knots to Las Aves – in particular Ave Barlovento (windward). As the name implies, the bird life is incredible as they come and go from tall Mangrove trees on the water's edge. Barlovento may have been our overall favorite anchorage.


Ave Sotovento (leeward) is 16 miles west, and it was a very interesting sail. Both the Aves have long, low sandbar beaches, but the one on Sotovento has been the scene of several shipwrecks, including a propane tanker, at least two coastal freighters and at least one yacht. Author Don Street theorizes that there are three white nav lights west of the hills of Gran Roque, all having somewhat similar characteristics. He thinks navigators may have mistaken which light they saw and believed they were making toward Bonaire to the west and already past Sotovento. We sailed offshore along the beach and viewed the wrecks. Then, we gybed around the north end of the island and reached south to the anchorage for the night.

The Venezuelan Coast Guard maintains a small outpost on Ave Sotovento, the westernmost island in Venezuela. Cruisers are supposed to check in by VHF. We tried, but got no response. We could see their base on our way in. The following morning, we departed for the 33 mile sail to Bonaire. We heard "velero" on the VHF and figured they saw us and were trying to contact us. Not sure what their message in Spanish was, but decided we were free to depart when we distinctly hear them say "bye!"





Bonaire, part of the Netherlands Antilles, represented a return to civilization after days of remote islands and seas. No anchoring is permitted, so we took a mooring off the main town of Kralendijk. Bonaire's population is only about 11,000, but has all the normal amenities, along with friendly people and excellent cuisine. It was good to be back among modern conveniences, but we really enjoyed sailing through this beautiful and unusual part of the Caribbean.

ARTICLE XV - ELECTION OF NEW MEMBERS

Section 1. Prospective members shall be considered for membership without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age or disability. The application of the candidate shall be submitted to the Membership Committee for thorough review. Incomplete applications will not be accepted.

Section 2. <u>Upon completion of the thorough review and an affirmative vote by the membership committee (composed of a Chairperson and four additional members) the applicant(s) shall have their names posted on the Club bulletin board for a period of twenty days. Applicants shall have their names read at the first General membership meeting following the 20 day posting of their name(s) on the Club's bulletin board.submission of their completed application, and after approval by a majority vote on first reading at a general membership meeting, have their names posted on the Club bulletin board for a period of twenty days. A second reading shall be given the applicant at the next following general membership meeting. The candidate must be present at both the first and second at the readings.</u>

Section 3. If approved by majority vote at the second reading the applicant shall then be notified by the Membership Committee of his or her invitation to become a member of the Club and on such notification, shall be advised of the entrance fee, dues and other financial payments necessary as a conditions precedent to becoming a member. Once the financial requirements are met, the applicant shall become a Member of the Club and must either New members may attend the next general membership meeting to be formally introduced and receive their membership materials or must may notify the Membership Committee of their acceptance of membership and receive their membership materials directly from the Committee.



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
