2006 Don Q Rum Keg Snipe Regatta

he skies in Miami were clear; winds were from the east, temps in low 80's, it was beautiful the entire weekend. 43 Snipe sailing teams from many SCIRANations, Puerto Rico, Bahamas, Norway, Mexico, Finland and from all over USA competed in the 2006 Don Q Rum Keg Snipe Regatta. The event is hosted by the Coconut Grove Sailing Club and Miami Snipe Fleet 7 and is sponsored annually by the Don Q Rum Destileria Serralles, Inc. This was the 40th Don Q!

On Friday March 31, after 2 races sailed on Biscayne Bay in winds from the East 12-15K, the team of Augie Diaz and Mark Ivey lead with two 2nd place finishes. Rogelio Padron and Camilo Cabrera from Bradenton, Fla won race one by a good margin. The second race was won by George Szabo and Lynn Fitzpatrick.

Saturday was another beautiful day in Miami. The winds were lighter (6-8 K), again out of the East,



with difficult chop. Sailing was TOUGH. There were lots of opportunities to fall back and catch up. Augie Diaz, with Mark Ivey crewing, managed a 5th and a 1st for the day, to take a commanding

COMMODORE'S REPORT

heSasakiWaterfrontMasterplanConsultants have released some initial work plans. The 72 page document may be viewed in its entirety on the following website: http://projects.sasaki.com/coconutgrove (look under work documents). The next step will come in late May when the consultants will release different design alternatives for public discussion.

The initial findings start with the City's Vision for the waterfront: "a coastal recreational park, human scale, public open spaces, connectivity for the pedestrian realm, waterfront promenades, diverse open spaces, an active park, and sensitive environmental spoil island connections (real or



visual)." The City's Requirements are: "A plan that reflects the growth and desires of the community, the overhaul of mooring fields to comply with FDEP, and finally, Spoil Islands rehabilitation: cleared of exotic plants, replanted with native species and redesigned for public access."

One of Sasaki's conclusions from the stakeholder meetings is that a recurrent goal of the City stakeholders (residents, merchants, hoteliers, etc.) is a "visual/physical connection to the waterfront." Consequently Sasaki's Master Plan Vision includes the following goals: "a weekend pedestrian and bicycle zone at the waterfront," and "enhanced connections along the waterfront." Their vision also mentions that the spoil islands show "high potential for recreational uses."

Particular references to the CGSC include one on page 41, regarding circulation in the lower waterfront area, which states that there is "no continuous sidewalk along the waterfront" in front of the CGSC. (Other locations are also cited for the lack of a continuous sidewalk along the waterfront.) Page 42 states that the "CGSC feels secluded and is fenced in, not an inviting environment." Page 50 recommends turning McFarlane Road into a pedestrian-oriented zone extending to the waterfront and connecting to a waterfront walkway in front of CGSC. Page 52 shows plans extending the waterfront walkway from Peacock Park to Dinner Key Marina (and crossing the frontage of the CGSC). Page 60 includes information from the ERA (economic consultants) stating the scope of their areas of investigation. Mooring fields include "lease abstracts under review, ERA analyzing other mooring facilities to determine relevant pricing rates, operating costs/characteristics and management approaches, analyze proposed mooring fields, governance, current uses, costs, revenues, etc." Dinner Key Marina: "ERA to provide recommended improvements (such as proposed DockMasters building and its relationship to moorings field.)" Under CGSC: "ERA will analyze costs, revenues and operating characteristics including required building maintenance costs, area upgrades and improvements, and competitive position."

What does all this mean for the CGSC? Basically, we can expect some changes to our modus operandi. There is strong momentum for a boardwalk or walkway facing the waterfront portion of the club's site. I have been told that other sailing organizations have managed to co-exist with a public walkway blocking their access to the water, and we may have to do so also. This will probably mean locked gates in front of the docks, and enhanced need for security protection. Liability issues are also involved, since it is risky to hoist boats in the middle of pedestrian traffic. We should not forget about areas of opportunity such as the spoil island.

The Masterplan Document is an evolving document and not all of its recommendations will be implemented. We will keep you informed of the progress. The City and the Community have indicated that the CGSC is an important part of the waterfront mix, and future meetings will determine how the club will change.

CG\$C RUN\$ BBYRA ONE-DE\$IGN No. 4 REGATTA

Sunday, March 26th was another "Chamber of Commerce" day here on Biscayne Bay, as CGSC hosted the month's one-design regatta. Bright sunshine and light to moderate NW winds, brought along by the passing of a cold front, greeted a fleet of 31 boats spread across four one-design classes.

CGSC was originally scheduled to run the PHRF No. 4 regatta the day before, with Key Biscayne YC handling the racing on Sunday. However, KBYC had a conflict on Sunday, so CGSC volunteered to switch the two dates which eliminated the problem.

Sunday's offshore wind direction made life a bit of a challenge for our Race Committee, as they contended with substantial cyclical shifts ranging from about 320 degrees to a little east of north. Nonetheless, three quality races were sailed, and overall, it was a great day on the water.

A substantial fleet of eight Etchells Class boats led the way, sailing the longer windward-leeward course. They were followed by ten Snipes, five Flying Scots, and eight Lasers, spread across full rigs, radials and 4.7's, all of whom sailed the shorter course. For the first two races, it was windward-leeward twice around. For the final race, in view of the wind direction coming from the Coconut Grove shoreline, the boats sailed a windwardleeward-windward course, finishing to windward and closer to home.

In the Etchells, Scott Piper finished third in the first race, but followed that up with two bullets to win the day by two points over Jeff Dever. Buddy Cribb started off with a 1-2, but a fifth place in the finale took him to third for day. The Snipe Class was very competitive, with the day's largest fleet out to tune up for the big Don Q Rum Annual Regatta the following weekend. Young Nick Voss of CGSC put together a 1-3-1 series to win the regatta by three points over Ernesto Rodriguez. Dad, Ken Voss, of CGSC was third.

Among the Flying Scots, CGSC's Bud Price sailed to a 1-2-1 series, which is hard to beat! He edged CGSC's Larry Whipple (both are past CGSC Commodores) who was a point behind in second, with CGSC's Ed Fry in third. For the Lasers, the full rig fleet was won by CGSC's David Hernandez with a one point victory over Michelle Davis. In the Laser 4.7 fleet, it was all CGSC, as Arielle DeLisser won handily, with Catie Skipp in second and Simon Lloyd-James in third. In the two boat Laser Radial fleet. Austin McGlannan was the winner with three bullets.

CGSC's Race Committee included Gail and Will Pulsford and their C&C 33 Sweet Lime, which was the Signal Boat. Ron Rostorfer was PRO, Anne Platt was the scribe and Julia McGlannan was the timer. Up to weather, it was Al Chapin and Dottie Rostorfer on the Mark Boat, while Carl Updyke and Teresa Jackson were aboard the Pin Boat.

COCONUT GROVE WATERFRONT - MASTER PLANS

What we have at the Coconut Grove Sailing Club is a small piece of what I'd like to call "Paradise" for boaters here and on Biscayne Bay. More than 50 Years ago a local paper said the Coconut Grove "Area Will Be a Yachtsman's Paradise".

In recent months you heard about the Coconut Grove Waterfront - Master Plan proposal being developed by Sasaki & Associates? The **CGSC** has a "stake" in the project and you were encouraged to attend a neighborhood meeting by our Commodore and Vice Commodore to give your input. On March 29, the Sasaki Project Team brought their analysis before the Community at the Women's Club of Coconut Grove.

The presentation was co-chaired by Mark Dawson of Sasaki and Tom Lavash of ERA. When they finished a slide program, they encouraged questions from the audience. As a member of the Board of Directors I attended, as did about 20 Club members.

We viewed the Sasaki analysis prepared from input by residents and business owners in Coconut Grove. The locals asked for Promenades with Cafes on the waterfront, better access to Recreational Parks and the Spoil Islands, and wanted Waterfront Rentals for fishing and boating. If you were wondering how you'd get to the Spoil Island off the Club, "yes" a bridge to the Mole was proposed. We saw a slide prepared by ERA that outlined what waterfront Leasehold's pay to the City of Miami in rent. I was amazed to see that Shake-A-Leg with their "new" building [paid for with a City Grant of \$400,000.or more] pays \$500. a year; Charthouse Restaurant pays \$121,644.; U.S. Sailing Center - \$9,016.; and the CGSC pay \$88,485. rent for

our building [paid for by members who purchased "Trust Certificates" of \$500 each in 1980] and our moorings area.

The *Coconut Grove Village Post - "Midsummer 1957"* issue [which my family had saved] talks about the Coconut Grove Waterfront that year. The headline reads "New Marina Plans Ready" to begin in Three Phases. Phase One – is an expansion plan for Dinner Key Marina from 182 Slips to 442 Slips. Phase Two was for filling and bulkheading at the end of 27th Avenue, i.e., Seminole Launch Ramp, and reduces moorings at the Coconut Grove Sailing Club. While - Phase Three was for dredging out to the existing Mole Island in front of the Club and included [building a bridge] connecting the Mole to MacFarland Road. Same old story – then and now!

Keep listening and staying up with proposals for our "little piece" of Paradise. Maybe the Coconut Grove Waterfront Master Plan will be implemented in our Lifetime. I hope so, and I also hope we each have a boat on the mooring and can climb the stairs to our Grove's Next Bar for our favorite brew.

ARTICLE XV - ELECTION OF NEW MEMBERS

Section 1. Prospective members shall be considered for membership without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age or disability. The application of the candidate shall be submitted to the Membership Committee for thorough review. Incomplete applications will not be accepted.

Section 2. Upon completion of the thorough review and an affirmative vote by the membership committee (composed of a Chairperson and four additional members) the applicant(s) shall have their names posted on the Club bulletin board for a period of twenty days. Applicants shall have their names read at the first General membership meeting following the 20 day posting of their name(s) on the Club's bulletin board submission of their completed application, and after approval by a majority vote on first reading at a general membership meeting, have their names posted on the Club bulletin board for a period of twenty days. A second reading shall be given the applicant at the next following general membership meeting. The candidate must be present at both the first and second at the readings.

Section 3. If approved by majority vote at the second reading the applicant shall then be notified by the Membership Committee of his or her invitation to become a member of the Club and on such notification, shall be advised of the entrance fee, dues and other financial payments necessary as a conditions precedent to becoming a member. Once the financial requirements are met, the applicant shall become a Member of the Club and must either New members may attend the next general membership meeting to be formally introduced and receive their membership materials or must may notify the Membership Committee of their acceptance of membership and receive their membership materials directly from the Committee.



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
