
CORAL CUP WOMEN'S REGATTA

GSC again hosted the annual Coral Cup Regatta for women skippers, this year on Sunday, March 4th. Coming on the morning

following a cold front, the weather forecast was less than stellar – 30% rain chance, 70% cloud cover, cool, and 15-20 knots of North wind in the afternoon. Luckily, it didn't work out that way. It was sunny to partly cloudy, warm, and winds were generally in the 7-14 knot range. All in all, it was a great regatta.

Ten boats came out

to contest this year's event. This included six PHRF boats, three Etchells and a Flying Scot – a pretty good turnout. The PHRF and one-design fleets were each split in two due to the



boats and the Flying Scot sailed the short course. All three races were twice around.

CGSC boats in the regatta included Goombay, the J-27 sailed by Regatta Chair and Biscayne Bay women's racing sparkplug Anita Hansen, Finesse, the Tartan 34 sailed by Audrey James, Clare Hamm sailed their Morgan 34 Hammertime, and Margaritaville, the Flying Scot, was sailed by

U.S. SAILING INSTRUCTOR CERTIFICATION COURSE

For the 7th year in a row the Coconut Grove Sailing Club is hosting a U.S. Sailing Instructor Certification course. US Sailing is the national governing body for sailing and provides training for all levels of instruction.

While the driving purpose for having the course here is to train our club instructors without having to make them travel, many club members have taken the opportunity to increase their knowledge. People come from all over the US to take the course. We have had them from as far as Wyoming and the State of Washington.

The course will be taught here at the club on 2 consecutive weekends, March 31, April 1, 7 and 8. It is a dynamic 40 hour course. Candidates must show their skills sailing small centerboard boats and handling a motor boat. While there is instruction and some time to polish your skills you must be reasonably competent at both of these skills to do well in the course. The course also covers knot tying and basic seamanship. There is a lot of time spent covering teaching and coaching techniques. Students who study before the course do the best.

When I took it I found that I learned a lot about sailing and tremendous amounts about the skill of teaching and coaching. I highly recommend it.

margin decreased each time. Finally, in the third race, Goombay was substantially closer to the faster rated Melges, and when the spray settled, the two boats <u>tied</u> on corrected time – right to the second!

In Gold Fleet "B," Tamsin Maund in Hot Streak, a J-22, put on an absolute clinic, winning each race by a large margin, both on elapsed and corrected time. Audrey James and Finesse posted a 3-2-2 series for second place, and Kerry Gruson's Sonar bested Hammertime by a point for third.

In the Silver Fleet "A" group, the three Etchells enjoyed very close racing all day long. It was spectacular to watch. Angie Vernon eventually won the class with a 1-1-3 series. Pat Stadel had a consistent 2-2-2 series to finish one point behind Angie, and Sharon Bourke was only one point back of Pat.

Margaritaville, as the only Silver "B" boat, and the only center boarder in the fleet, sailed the



short course with no competition in class, but Susan Walcutt and crew sailed the boat very well, and likely would have prevailed over other boats had there been any. In



fact, her corrected times would have put the Scot in either a second or close third among the Gold "B" fleet, which sailed the same course.

The Coral Cup Perpetual Trophy is awarded to the Gold Fleet boat with the lowest combined corrected time. This year, because of the Gold "A" and "B" classes, the Trophy was awarded jointly

SOCIAL MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL

Sea Scout Ship 1946 - Monthly Update

Sea Scout Ship 1946 is up and running – we've been busy introducing prospective members to the adventure of Sea Scouting, we are planning for upcoming events, and occasionally we get to go sailing. We're also working with the South Florida Council's long range planning committee, to establish a goal of having a SoFla team win the William I. Koch International Sea Scout Cup.

The Sea Scout Cup is an international biennial regatta in which Sea Scouts compete in double-handed dinghy racing – it's the premier event in Sea Scouting, with a trophy to match. In July 2008, Sea Scouts from around the world will be heading to the US Naval Academy in Annapolis - the host for the Fourth Annual William I. Koch International Sea Scout Cup. This fiveday, youth sailing regatta is open to young men and women between the ages of 14 and 21 who are actively registered in the Sea Scout program. Teams from the United States and 20 countries will test their seamanship and leadership skills as they race Vanguard 420's.

The 2008 Sea Scout Cup regatta will be held at the Naval Academy's Robert Crown Sailing Center. It's a wonderful opportunity, and it will probably bring out some of the best young sailors in the country. The Naval Academy has consistently produced one of the best intercollegiate sailing programs in the country, with a long history of turning out collegiate All-Americans, College Sailors of the Year, Olympians, and America's Cup sailors.

We've already started working toward our goal of bringing that beautiful trophy home to the "Sailboat Racing Capital of America". Of course, training for the Sea Scout Cup regatta will require a lot of work by Sea Scouts who set their sights on going to Annapolis. That sounds like a long time from now, but the regional qualifier regatta is only 8 months away – so, the heat is on to get our SoFla teams ready.

2007 PINEAPPLE CUP MONTEGO BAY RACE

Ft. Lauderdale to Jamaica

This year's Pineapple Cup Race to Montego Bay, Jamaica got underway on Friday, February 16th under overcast skies with occasional light showers. This biennial 811 mile classic passes through the Bahamas, south past "Mira Por Vos" to the Windward Passage between Haiti and Cuba, and then downwind in the trades to Jamaica. It is frequently called "ocean racing's most complete test."

Going back to 1961, some of the most famous ocean racing boats in history have been associated with this race. These include *Escapade, Kialoa, Tenacious, Ticonderoga and Windward Passage*, to name a few. Boats from Biscayne Bay have known success here, including overall wins by Sennett Duttenhofer's *Man-O-War* from BBYC in 1985, and Stuart Hebb's *Thin Ice* from CRYC in the last race – 2005. In fact, *Thin Ice* holds the overall corrected time record for the race.

There were no CGSC boats in this year's race, but several have sailed in the past. These include Bill Beavers' *Finesse*, Art Auwaerter's *Samurai*, and John Martin's *Scirocco*. Maybe next time!

This year's fleet was small in number, with 20 entrants, but large in boat size. IRC Class A consisted of seven boats at 66 feet or longer. IRC Class B included two Transpac 52's, *IMP*, the well known old IOR boat, and *The Cone of Silence*, smallest boat in the fleet by far at just 30 feet, but rating in mid-class. Now that's fast! Finally, there was the seven boat PHRF fleet which again included *Thin Ice* from up the street.

No records were set this year, but it was still a great race. The overall winner of the Pineapple Cup was the J-120 *Carinthia*, with *The Cone of Silence* less than 30 minutes back after over three and a half days of racing. *Captivity*, a 76 foot custom sloop was dismasted in heavy air and put into Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

April 11, 2007 Reef Fish: Here and There, Then and Now

Presented by Todd Kellison, National Marine Fisheries Service

Mooring Committee

We were down to 150+ moored boats after the 2006 storms and their associated problems, but are now back up to 180 and growing; this surely helps pay bills.

The Moorings Regulation and Lease Agreement have recently undergone some changes which we all need to be familiar with and then sign the new Lease Agreement. COPIES MAY BE OBTAINED IN THE OFFICE. 1) Both documents are very explicit concerning what happens if boats are left at the moorings after evacuations are called: THE OWNERS ARE REQUIRED TO RELINQUISH THEIR MOORINGS FOR ONE (1) YEAR. 2) Reference is made to an ad hoc Moorings Evacuation Committee headed by the Commodore and to include the Vice Commodore, Manager, Dock Master (ex officio), Moorings Chairman and Weather Advisers. This committee will assess approaching storms/hurricanes and publicize when Moorings Evacuations will take place and the Club secured for potential storm/hurricane threats. This process is much the same as that used by other Biscayne Bay clubs and is necessitated by NOAA having changed their procedure whereby they now sometimes declare a storm a hurricane, or hurricane threat, before it becomes one. This contrasts to the old way of progressing from Watch to Warning, then to a Hurricane. We know of no better way to do this, but know that we cannot leave boats at the CGSC during hurricanes.

These changes were put in place to insure the survival of the CGSC, it's boats, building, property and reputation with the City, and to limit insurance cancellations and problems. The one-year mooring relinquishment is actually not that different time-wise from what has historically happened to boats left on the moorings during hurricanes, i.e., the probability of such boats being severely damaged is very high and many never return, after a year or otherwise. There is really no excuse for leaving boats in danger here in the eye of hurricane threats as there are much more safer places to go; it requires planning, preparation and implementation, is simply part of keeping a boat on the water here, and is not that difficult.

NOW IS THE TIME TO MAKE HURRICANE PLANS FOR YOUR BOAT, including lining up help, acquiring ground tackle (three (3) large anchors are needed - NO WIMPY ANCHORS PLEASE), and becoming familiar with the safe harbor sites. PLEASE DO NOT GET CAUGHT UNAWARE AND UNPREPARED. KNOW WHAT YOU ARE GOING TO DO, OR HAVE DONE, AND HOW TO GET IT ACCOMPLISHED. Again, there is really no excuse for arguing with or ignoring hurricanes; it's much like walking in front of trains or large trucks, etc. It is necessary to visit the sites with your boat to know how to get there easily, depth and type holding ground, anchors to use, etc. Some folks make plans to have their boats up the Miami River, in protected canal spots behind houses, Indiantown, home on trailers, etc.; however, for most of us it comes to four local sites:

1) West of Star Island: 3 bridges N of CGSC: Rickenbacker,

Dodge Island, McArthur, then right past the Miami Yacht Club to the Flagler Memorial and right. Use three (3) anchors 120 degrees apart off the bow with 10:1 maximum scope.

- 2) Marine Stadium: Thru Rickenbacker and right to out from the stadium bleachers and Rowing Club. Use three (3) anchors 120 degrees apart off the bow with 10:1 maximum scope.
- 3) No Name Harbor Key Biscayne Bill Baggs State Park.
- 4) Coral Gables Waterway mangroves: S past Four Way Channel and into the Waterway: 1st left to the end. This is a preferred spot for many, but it pays to go early as it gets crowded; FOUR RULES APPLY: 1- Do not anchor nor attach lines across canals unless they are COMPLETELY weighted (kelleted) to the bottom. 2- Do not tie up to private property. 3- Do not attach to mangrove trunks, but walking anchors well into the mangrove roots is O.K. 4- Everyone is responsible for damages they cause. Method: nose the boat near the mangroves but afloat, walk anchors into the mangroves, then angle crossed stern anchors to hold the boat out from the mangroves in case of surge. Note: These canals are scoured clean by tidal current and offer poor holding. Heavy kellets and large stern anchors are needed.

The CGSC will endeavor to provide transport to and from the sites as needed; we will need volunteers. More specifics on all this next time but please make arrangements with helpful friends for hurricane season. **Hurricane Preparedness Classes will be announced soon.** Please make sure your boat tanks, fuel and filters are clean and the engine is reliable This means that it must be run at least monthly, the battery kept up and the propeller clean.

Please ask the Moorings Committee questions if you need to. The Dock Masters have their own chores, now and at hurricane time, so let them be and direct questions, e-mails, calls or see us at the CGSC. It gets easier once we get into it.

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
