ADVENTURE\$ IN THE EXUMA\$

t started slowly. Friday night it was shopping at Publix. Three carts later, filled with steaks, chicken and shrimp, veggies and fruit, water, soda and beer, phase one was completed. Finding a place for everything on board was a challenge. There was some question

whether there would be room for people, but all was solved eventually. Then Saturday came and went. Sunday came and went. Finally, with all business problems and weather concerns resolved, the crew arrived Monday morning to board the good ship NAMASTE, a Freedom 45. Nick Martens was captain and Mark Buller, Fritz Muller and I were crew.

It was out the channel, past Key

Biscayne and the lighthouse, across a bit of the Biscayne Channel and out to sea. Light winds in the wrong direction forced motoring across the Stream, over North Rocks just north of Bimini and across the Grand Bahama Bank to an anchoring spot just North of the Northwest Channel marker. Nick cooked wonderful steaks on the grill and Chef Fritz prepared a feast below, featuring a potato and onion dish. It sounded even better as Fritz announced the whole meal in French.

Tuesday morning we went around Northwest Channel

marker and headed southwest to Lyford Cay on the northwest corner of New Providence. There we cleared customs. We also found that it was a requirement that all beer brought in be consumed or disposed of within 24 hours of arrival and replenished with Kalik or Saunders, a new Bahamian beer. We complied as quickly as possible and, luckily, we didn't have to dispose of any. Ours was one of

the smaller vessels in the harbor. There were four motor yachts and one sail yacht well in excess of 100 feet. Mike Lovelady arrived by plane. For dinner we finally settled on a small pub in the marina that was definitely for the yachts crews and local help, but not for the owners or

guests on these fine yachts. There we found some of the best cracked conch ever. That evening a good amount of rum was consumed to meet another requirement that all rum brought in or purchased in the Bahamas be consumed before departing the

Bahamas. Later, Mark, sharing the forward cabin with Mike Lovelady, used his presidential protection training to save Mike . He awoke to find smoke in his cabin. He woke Mike and stood him up to keep his head close to the ceiling and opened the overhead hatch. Unfortunately



the smoke was the same smoke we had smelled earlier coming from brush being burned close by and opening the hatch just added to the smoke. Later a battle ensued over who should have the one fan aboard the vessel. It was a large floor fan. It was taken by the Captain to his cabin. Later, in an act of insurrection ,Mark took it back to the forward cabin. Unfortunately, I was sleeping on an air mattress on the sole of the main salon and the fan passed

back and forth over me accompanied by heavy feet. Eventually sanity prevailed.

Wednesday morning, Fritz departed by plane. In the afternoon, we roamed the island by car and dropped Mark off at the airport. We were finally ready to go to the Exumas!!!

Thursday, after stocking more beer and ice, we set forth around the west end of New Providence. The wind gods were against us again and we motored to the southeast. The seas were choppy and passing over the White Bank seeing the coral heads was a challenge. It required someone on the bow

with keen eyesight for quite a while calling out the location of each corral head. By late afternoon we anchored outside Highbourne Cay.

Friday, it's anchor up and away at dawn, dawn being about 11 a.m. as usual. We sailed past one beautiful cay after another. Finally in the late afternoon we arrived at Warderick Wells Cay, home

of the Exuma Land and Sea Park. The Park covers 176 square miles of cays, rocks and reefs from Little Wax Cay to the North and Conch Cay to the South. The inner harbor was filled so we took a mooring near Emerald Rock. It was time for a swim in the azure waters. We then took the dinghy to the headquarters building, but found the building closed at4 p.m. and it was now about 5 p.m. We saw a notice on the bulletin board that a party



was being held the next day (Saturday) to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Park. We knew this was where we had to be, to represent Coconut Grove Sailing Club since we were convinced that no one else from the Club had made it to the Exumas. Nick and Mike decided to go to a beach nearby and climb a hill to catch the sunset. In the bushes they heard a rustling sound. They thought it might be chickens or even wild pigs. Instead they found an animal that looked like a large, hairy rat with a long nose. At the headquarters building the next day, we found out it was a Hudai (Who-Da),an endangered species. Instantly we decided to form the Hudai Preservation Society, with us as Founding Members, with the

purpose to "save the Hudai". Stay tuned. Associate Memberships may become available for a reasonable fee.

On Saturday, it was some exploring and snorkeling. No great coral was found, but the water was crystal clear and there were colorful fish under the ledges. Then it was up to

the headquarters building to register and buy a collection of hats, coolies and tee shirts. At 5:30 it was back to the big anniversary party on the beach. Not only were there burgers, chips and beans, but free cold beer was provided by a new brewery, Sanders Beer. There was a good crowd from 15 to 20 boats. We officially represented Coconut Grove Sailing Club with a big burgee. Appropriate pictures were taken with the crowd and the burgee up front. It is amazing what you find when you try meeting new people. Mike found a couple that lived very close to his home in Ormond Beach. I found someone from my hometown of Babylon, Long Island, New York. As a teenager, I had worked in his family's lumberyard and years later he and his wife had sailed on my Dad's Crosby Cat "CHICO". New friends and a great party.

On Sunday it was unfortunately time to turn North. We sailed to Normans Cay, the former headquarters of Carlos Leder, the Columbian drug lord. The docks where drugs were unloaded

> and loaded were still there, but rotting. Parts of a plane that crashed during the drug wars still sit in the harbor. The well was still there from my last trip complete with a bucket and good water once you got past .the frogs. The airstrip is still a working strip and a plane landed there after circling the fleet at about 50 feet. A long trek across the cay was a complex with several villas and a bar called "MacDuff's". The beer was cold but the cracked conch was no match for the conch we had earlier at Lyford Cay.

> > Monday, with the winds howling from the north, we crossed the Yellow Bank. With the wind the water was rough and there were clouds at times making the coral heads near and in at least one case above the surface hard to see. Again



a bow watch was necessary. That afternoon we pulled into the Nassau Harbor Club. It was a good place for some pool time and convenient for grocery shopping. We also found a Freedom 45, just like Nick's and spent time with the owners on both boats. That evening we all went to dinner together where we



celebrated the owner's birthday and had excellent C h i n e s e cuisine.

Tuesday, it was Northwest under sail and a good breeze to Northwest Channel Marker and then west

across the Grand Bahama Banks until anchoring at about 2:30 a.m. three miles east of Cat Cay. The wind was blasting through the rigging and the water was rough, but we all rested for the final trip home.

Thursday brought a new challenge. After leaving his computer based Nobel Tec chart plotting system to check the weather, Nick was unable to get the Nobel Tec system back on line. Here we were in sight of Cat Cay and could go nowhere. Finally, it was decided to use an ancient system of compass, paper chart and line of sight, aided by an old GPS that gave only current position. Thus we guided ourselves to and around the Gun Cay Cut and out to sea. Using a course adjusted for the Gulf Stream, we started with the winds at 25 knots abaft and the seas confused. We decided to jibe and go further



south for a better ride and sail. Later we jibed again and were right on course for Fowey Rocks and Bug Light. Finally it was up Biscayne Channel and across the bay to home.

It was a wonderful trip. It was far too short to be anything but a taster. A month is good to see a reasonable

portion of the Exumas. Two months is better. What I saw brought back good memories and the urge to get back and see the rest again.



Hugh'; Q&A

Q. I got a letter stating my file was missing my moorings agreement, insurance, etc. I'm sure I provided it years ago. A. You very well may have. Unfortunately, before Lauren came on board in the office, we feel her predecessor preferred "The Circular File" vs. placing needed documents in the member files. As a rule, we review the files of members with moored boats yearly. After much work, I was very disheartened to review the files and find so much missing information. I apologize for this inconvenience, but can report that 90% of the members contacted quickly supplied copies of the needed information. Thanks to those that have and we eagerly await those that haven't responded.

Q) My group has met at the club for the past several years at no cost. Now, when I call I'm told there is a room charge. Why? A) Whether you see it or not there is always a cost to the club members in the form of set/clean up, labor, AC, lights, etc.

The club is happy to provide civic groups free space for meetings or events. Civic groups are considered schools, police, fire departments, the Coast Guard Aux. town hall meetings or select non profit organizations.

Condo, Apartment or Neighborhood associations tend to be private and do not qualify under our guidelines.. Effective 7/1/08, Whatwe consider as private civic organization will be charged a room usage fee of \$75.00 for their meetings.

Q) I was confronted by an employee several weeks back over my car. I told him, the car belonged to my son and therefore didn't have a decal. Hey, I'm a full member and the dock hand knows me. What's the big deal.

A) I've been criticized for harping on this subject for many months and not towing any cars. I truly prefer not to, but your question simply opens up the whole discussion again. It's a very simple rule.

If you don't have a decal, your car is subject to tow (approx.
\$175. to get it back), regardless of your membership status.
Regular and Life members and special guest ONLY qualify for parking decals or limited permits - two cars per member family.
Hand written notes on your dash "I'm a member", "I'm on the race committee (we have passes for that)" or "I'm out sailing" just doesn't cut it for the Regular members who pay higher yearly dues to have an equal shot at a first come, first served parking spot. I don't blame them.

If you're a Regular, Life member or special guest, please get a parking decal or limited permit. Beyond that, you leave your vehicle to the mercy of the towing company. We have 50 spaces, when they are full, there full. Double parking, even though you left your keys with the bar or dock staff, puts the club in violation of fire codes and will not be tolerated. If you have questions or are not clear on something, please

Dear Commodore Buller:

As recently discussed, the City of Miami supports a long term relationship and partnership in the activities, events, and regattas that are hosted by both the United States Sailing Center (USSC) and the Coconut Grove Sailing Club (CGSC).

The latest draft of the Coconut Grove waterfront master plan proposes a regatta park with both sailing clubs housed in new facilities on the waterfront near Dinner Key Marina. This plan expands the area for regattas and special events to improve the sailing events that come to Coconut Grove annually. During large regatta events, the City of Miami intends to allow the use of the Kennedy Park building to supplement waterfront access.

It is the City of Miami's intent that the USSC and CGSC remain in their current building locations until new City of Miami facilities are completed including waterfront access. At such time, we would propose that both organizations be relocated to the new facilities. In the short term, we propose to negotiate an agreement to provide for the CGSC's ability to continue to stay at its current location, subject to compliance with all applicable laws, deed restrictions, and approval by the City Commission.

The City will continue to work with CGSC regarding the mooring of its members' sailboats in both the soon to be constructed outer mooring field and the new inner mooring field, the design of which is mandated by regulatory agencies including, but not limited to, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection. Consistent with the latest draft of the Coconut Grove waterfront master plan, we are proposing the inner mooring field remain for sailboats only. We recognize the rental payments to the City may require adjustment in the future due to modifications to the configuration and operations of the inner mooring field.

Thank you for promoting sailing activities in Coconut Grove that contributes to a sport which brings people from all over the world to enjoy the benefits of our waterfront.

From the Manager . . .

On July 1st, CGSC began its new fiscal year. This means a new Commodore, Officers and several new Board members. It's also time to renew and pay your yearly membership fees.

The '08/'09 Budget was approved at the Annual General Meeting, held June 6th. There have been some cost increases due to the ever increasing general economic condition that we all our experiencing. (An email blast was sent out immediately after the meeting with the new rates and due dates). However, you still have until August 1st to pay them in full or complete a Credit Card authorization form to pay the club and allow your MC or Visa to break up your payments to them.

The new approved yearly dues are as follows:

None

- Regular Member \$635. to \$665.
- -Life Member
- Jr. Member \$50. to \$75.
- Social Member \$100. to \$120.
- Initiation of \$1000. remains the same.

- The yearly \$25. Capital assessment remains the same for all Regular and Life members

- The monthly \$10. legal fees assessed to all Regular and Life members shall remain the same, as long as needed.

Supplemental Fees & Cost:

- Mooring fees shall be increased from \$7. to \$8. per foot (LOA)...

- The transient (guest) mooring fee has been increased from \$25. to \$35. p/day.

- Boat repair service launch cost,* \$5. per day, billed to member.

- Strip and rack fees remain the same.

* Many boat repair folks use the services of the launch throughout the day. They will make numerous trips back and forth to a member's boat, because they forgot the right tools, etc. With Marine fuel now hitting almost \$5. a gal. it's imperative that your repairmen understand the situation and use one of the club's dinghies - free of charge.

Payment increases were reflected on your July statement and again you have until August 1st. Beyond that point, we must assume you are dropping your membership and your club services will be suspended until which time as you come into the office and reactivate your account by bringing your account up to date and paying any past due expenses.

Again, as the cost of fuel continues to rise, CGSC is being billed fuel surcharges from every purveyor we currently deal with. As you've probably noted, we had to make price adjustments to our food menu. Most are in the range of .50 cents per item (some less). Not bad considering we've not raised food prices in over three years.

As to increased liquor prices - fear not! I'll do my best to maintain our current prices despite the cost increase the club is currently being subjected to. Since we are not in a South Beach locale commanding \$14.00 for a Mojito or \$9. for a glass of wine, I think we can hold back for another 6-12 months.

Again, I understand your feelings and concerns about price increases. At one time the much accepted goal and belief in joining a private club or association was to get better prices than on the open market. This was achieved since the purveyors acknowledged that clubs, provide a solid built in market and the purveyors could offer consistent quantity purchasing discounts at longterm locked in prices.

Unfortunately, in today's world of mega suppliers providing for mega concerns, private entities are considered "small potatoes!"

The days of five cent cokes and thirty-two cent gallons of gas are long gone. It's not the club trying to make a profit, it's the club just trying to keep up!

Participation is everything to keep member prices in check. Increased sales volume at lower prices, hurts our cost %, but can bring more cash to the bottom line and that hopefully reduces other member cost increases in the future.

Participate and support the CGSC. The returns will be greater in the long run




