Joing Forces to Do Sping Cleaning in the Fall


HANKS ALL WHO PARTICIPATED IN "WORK WEEKEND 2008"!!!

Looking back on this past fall and summer I have to believe this has been one of the best, if not THE BEST, six months for the club's sailing programs. Summer camp attendance increased significantly over the previous year, and participation in our adult sailing programs, including the learn-to-sail and small boat sailing clinic has been outstanding. In addition



participation in our fall youth learn-to-sail and Opti racing programs has been much higher than last year. All of this great success is due to the continuing efforts of Nick Mansbach our Sailing Director, Richard Crisler – Chair of our Adult Sailing Programs, and Gail Pulsford and Antonio Beraranjo – co-chairs of the Youth / Opti Racing Committee. So, on behalf of the CGSC I want to thank all the members – regular, social and junior (and their dedicated parents), who have participated, and/or volunteered your time in our sailing programs this fall, and invite you all to continue your participation in the coming months. Through your efforts you make CGSC a truly unique "community of sailors".

As we look ahead to spring 2009 we have a number of exciting activities and events ahead of us. First is the winter/spring youth learn-to-sail and Opti racing season. With a group of racers that continue to improve, and backed by a terrific group of parents, I look forward to an exciting spring season. As in the fall season our youth / opti racing committee will be making decisions regarding which of several regattas to attend in the coming months.

In addition, as Nick Mansbach has reported in his article we are working to establish a new Biscayne Bay Youth Sailing Association (BBYSA). The purpose of this organization is to enhance the learn-to-sail and racing programs provided by various entities around the Bay, through coordination of educational programs, racing and community service events.

Another opportunity we will be looking at this spring is the preparation of applications for grant monies to support our youth sailing programs. One of the major programs available in the past has been the State's "21st century Community Learning Centers" grant program. We will be exploring a partnership with Miami-Dade County Public Schools in this effort. We will also look for opportunities to partner with the City of Miami and other organizations in the pursuit of grant applications.

One additional important event coming this spring is the CGSC Annual Rendezvous. I have asked a group of members to help me plan and organize this weekend event. One of the first items of business for the committee will be to select a date for the rendezvous. In the past we have selected a weekend in April – so hold that month for this great weekend party at Elliott Key. As I promised last summer I intend to make the 2009 Rendezvous one of the best ever!

Hi all, sorry that it's been awhile but regatta season is in full swing with your youth sailing programs. There is sooo much to report, so grab a cold beverage & a snack, and enjoy!

I'll start off with a very successful Safety Seminar that was funded & made possible by the Coconut Grove Sailing Foundation on November 17th. The object of the seminar was to provide some very useful tips on safety for those providing Sailing Programs on Biscayne Bay. The guest speaker was Ms. Joni Palmer who flew in from her home in Annapolis where she currently is in charge of basic sail training for the U.S. Naval Academy for approximately 1200 incoming freshmen. Ms. Palmers' resume is very impressive to say the least. She has conducted over 80 regional sailing program management seminars around the country as well as developing and managing 15 US Sailing National Sail Training Symposiums. Joni was also instrumental in developing the US Sailing small boat instructor training program and has been an active member of every US Sailing committee that deals with training, youth and community sailing. We had a whopping 47 attendees that ranged from MDCPS to the Coast Guard Auxiliary, and representatives from just about every organization that is involved with sailing on the Bay. Ransom-Everglades school provided a great lunch for all with the Coconut Grove Sailing Foundation stepping up, once again to provide a wonderful continental breakfast for all attending.

As a result of everyone being in the same place at the same time, we had an opportunity to do a lot of networking, and the consensus of the majority all feel that these "Seminars" happen more frequently with perhaps other organizations pitching in and sponsoring similar events on a regular basis. This spawned an idea that perhaps we should form an organization that would be dedicated to the safety of all on the bay as well as being good stewards of the natural environment of beautiful Biscayne Bay, thus the Rear Commodore and I sat down and brainstormed about how best to make this happen and we came up with the idea of forming the BBYSA, the Biscayne Bay Youth Sailing Association. So far we have come up with a mission statement as well as an outline of every individual's role in the association and are looking for an "Umbrella" organization to sponsor us. To date I have proposed this to the BBYRA (Biscayne Bay Yacht Racing Association) who agreed to "Help" with computer links etc... but are not willing to adopt us. I will not get discouraged and vow to make this happen one way or the other, so if anyone reading this has any ideas, I'd love to hear them!

On to sailing... I'd like to start with the adult sailing program and give kudos to our Adult Sailing Chairman, Richard Crisler for the outstanding job he's done with getting this once lacking program back on it's feet. "TOOTH AND NAIL" AT CGSC'S 2008 SE FLORIDA PHRF CHAMPIONSHIPS!

It was another very hard fought series when the top PHRF boats in southeast Florida came to compete for their annual championship at Coconut Grove Sailing Club November 15-16. This year's event saw nine of the biggest and fastest racers in PHRF 1, six boats in the PHRF 2 fleet, long dominated by CGSC competitors, and one intrepid racer in PHRF 3, Karen Mitchell's Shake-a-Leg entry, Sailing for Life.

It could be said that we had typical weather for this regatta – Biscayne Bay's typical SE sea breeze on Saturday, and a typically hard NW wind Sunday after the cold front passed Saturday night. It was a five-race, no throw out regatta, with three races completed Saturday followed by two heavy air races Sunday.

The forecast for Saturday called for a progressive shift from the SE towards the SW as the cold front approached.

Fortunately, this didn't happen, as our afternoon thermal dominated and the wind stayed in the SE. In the first race, the fleet was sent upwind at 165 degrees, but a right hand shift to 180 caused CGSC's Race Committee to signal a course change to that bearing for the second lap. By the start of Race 2, the wind had come left all the way to 150 degrees, and for Race 3, we were back where we started the day at 165 degrees. Wind speeds were

in the range of six to eleven knots. All races in the series were on windward-leeward, twice around courses. It was a great day for racing on the Bay.

By Saturday evening, there was a one point margin for the lead in PHRF 1, with Thin Ice, Stuart Hebb's Aerodyne 38 leading Primal Scream, the C&C 115 sailed by Steven Stollman. However, the trend foretold the potential for


change, as Thin Ice had a 2-1-4 series while Primal Scream was heading upward with a 4-2-2 series.

The racing was close all day, but the PHRF 1 results for Race 3 were especially so. Man-O-War, Sennett Duttenhofer's Tripp 33, won by only three seconds on corrected time over Primal Scream. But, Pipe

Dream XIV, the Tripp 33 sailed by Scott and Tom Piper was only three seconds behind that for third.

In PHRF 2, CGSC's Randy Clee, racing his Evelyn 32 Dutch Treat, posted a hard to beat 2-1-1 series for a four point lead over Eduardo Luaces Lindenberg 28, Tiburon, with Russ and Vicky Horn's Jammin a point back, both also being from CGSC of course!

Sunday's cold front winds were about the opposite of the



The racing continued to be close. In fact, in Race 4, Thin Ice and Pipe Dream XIV actually tied to the second on corrected time for fourth place, causing each to score 4.5 points for the Race. Primal Scream added a 1-4 record to Saturday's results, giving them the championship in PHRF 1 by four points. Race 4 was the only race won by the champions. 
The Rules Have Changed!

Some of the important rules you know well that determine your safety and your tactics on the racecourse will be different on January 1 than they were on December 31, applied to every regatta from round-the-buoys races, to junior regattas, to Key West Race Week. Since the most important changes affect how boats react when converging around marks and obstructions, it is important for all sailors to quickly learn the changes to avoid potentially dangerous or frustrating situations.

On Wednesday, January 7, at 7:00 p.m., area sailors will convene to review and discuss these changes at the Coconut Grove Sailing Club. In a multimedia presentation with extensive discussion, U.S. Sailing Senior Judges Bob Meagher and Mike Weber will explain the most critical changes and explore their impact with the group on racecourse tactics.

Hey Folks,

Moorings Committee

Ours is a sailing club and so folks sail. In fact many of our member and CGSC owned boats have no motors. The problem of boats being moored at the CGSC sometimes getting scraped and gouged has always existed. It is often assumed, right or wrong, that someone sailing thru the moorings caused the damage. However, unless someone sees it happen and makes an issue of it, the damage is only discovered later, often much later. People seldom step forward to pay for or fix damage, or even tell the boat owner of it. However, everybody: members, students and employees, etc. owe it to everyone to avoid damaging boats when possible. The CGSC makes every effort to prevent damage from training boat activities. For members, this includes using motors, if you have one and know how to operate, please use it whenever possible when going and coming to moorings. Not that running a motor totally avoids the prospect of bumping boats; it doesn't. It generally helps if the sails are down and the approach or exit is upwind. Also, during any breeze, getting close to boats, particularly light boats is asking for bumps. The wind puffs can jerk the moored boat around guickly and make the bumping almost unavoidable. Also, we should minimize travel thru the moorings, but to just come and go sufficient to meet our needs. Sailing back and forth thru the moorings, figure eights, tacking, etc. and without help, is not cool; these things constitute poor seamanship and are to a degree irresponsible and disfraternal. Also, the CGSC owes it to everyone to store boats as safely as possible as that's part of why we pay for boat storage, have night watchmen, spotlights, security checks, etc. Moreover, acquiring the reputation of not protecting boats properly could surely spell our death knell with the insurance companies.

Personally, I readily admit that I don't know the motivation for sailing thru the moorings with no help nor motor, if one is available. Nor is it obvious to me why people jump out of perfectly good airplanes unless they have to, bungee jump and play Russian roulette. The difference is major, tho, between those "sports" and whooping thru the moorings: the odd time when they go wrong, which does happen, is a simply thud or body parts loss for someone doing precisely what they like!!! No harm comes to anyone else unless they're landed upon, really liked the deceased, or were owed money, tools, etc. by them. Bumping boats hurts someone else not part of the equation, and the CGSC, which is all of us. Most people who like to sail to their mooring, with or without a motor, seek corner, side or end spots for easy access. We've always tried our best to do this; it saves a lot of unnecessary trouble and hard feeling. Should you discover damage to your boat from such or expected activity, or see it happen to other's boat, please report it in writing to the Moorings Chairman and Board of Directors with as many factual details as can be collected. Placing a record of it before the Board and entered in the minutes may not solve the problem then, but will place the matter in a better position for next time, which will likely come. It will probably be a matter of time, so just be alert on it.

The birds are back and there are three relatively simple things that minimize the problem: 1) Run heavy monofilament line from the spreader bolt to two inches up on the upper shrouds to deprive them of this roosting spot. 2) Place a small windmill with one blade shorter than the other, with a small flag on a stick, hoisted on a halyard with a down-tag line to the masthead (Birds fear getting et by things that "shake in the day and night") . These two things generally solve it; however, if still not happy,

contact www.bird-x.com (1.800.860.0473), purchase bird repellent (about \$10), and rub it on wherever birds sit: backstay, top roller-furl spool, shrouds, triatics, etc. THIS WORKS !!! However, if really fired up, bird-x sells balloon funny faces, fake owls, hawks, snakes, possums and other critters. All this will surely be entertaining, but for a fact the first three things are all that's needed. Several things, for a fact are no help whatever: 1) Concluding that the birds are "out to get you", and that other members are "herding" them onto your boat by use of their clever devices. 2) Complaining mightily to whoever will listen, particularly the hired-help, some of whom are so bored with it they're in total denial and contemplate Hari Kari to get away from it all!!! 3) Collecting great poundages of bird doo, folded carefully in a tarp, to sail around with on the boat; aspirators are recommended for this to thwart disease, and 4) Conning the "old lady" into scrubbing the hide off the boat using powerful chemicals. Trust me; all this is ho-hum and unnecessary. Please do not get into a "deep blue funk" about it all.

We have moorings begging and surely offer competitive rates, so please invite people to the CGSC if they're looking for storage. If you have a mooring here or plan to get one, a good thing to do is to peruse the Moorings Regs. once in awhile. They were "evolved" to solve real problems, some interesting.

Sail often friends. Please let us know if you have a mooring problem, or want to discuss anything. See you there.
