oconut Grove Sailing Club hosted its third and final regatta of the Inaugural Audi Melges 20 Miami Winter Series March 11 – 13, 2010. The three days of racing were part of the new Bacardi Miami Sailing Week which included five classes racing on three circles

in the Bay. For this event, the Melges 20's were joined by a fleet of Melges 24's who also lived at CGSC and raced on the same circle with the 20's.

Social Side

The event started off with a huge regatta-wide party at CGSC

Wednesday evening that was sponsored by Bacardi and featured new CGSC Chef Tara Abrams' excellent appetizers. The party was a great success in every way. Bacardi established a Hospitality Village under tents adjacent to the

Convention Center that was open all week, and included an excellent sailing color photography exhibit by Cory Silken. The awards presentation Saturday afternoon was in Peacock Park next to CGSC with more tents, music and food in addition to the trophies. The event is an outgrowth of

the traditional Bacardi Cup Star Class Regatta, and should become an annual fixture on the Biscayne Bay sailing calendar.

VICE COMMODORE REPORT


or those who may be new to the club, or not aware of the club structure and management, I thought it would be useful to review several important upcoming club events. We are fast approaching the end of the year at CGSC! Sounds strange, but as many of you know our fiscal year ends on June 30. This in turn sets in motion a number of year-end events at the club.

First among these in order of occurrence is the formation of the nominating committee which is charged with developing nominees for Secretary, Treasurer, Rear and Vice Commodore, and three board of director positions that will be coming open. The nominating committee must deliver its nominations no less than 30 days before the annual meeting. The Vice Commodore automatically succeeds to the office of Commodore. Richard Crisler has generously agreed to serve as Chair of the nominating committee, as he has done for some years. In addition to Richard there will be five other members appointed to the committee by the board of directors.

In addition to the nominating committee the Finance Committee will also be working over the next two months to develop a proposed budget for the Club for fiscal year 2010-2011. That committee is chaired by the Treasurer and includes the Vice Commodore and 3 other members. The proposed budget will be taken to

the Board of Directors at their April meeting, for review and subsequent approval at the May meeting.

That brings us to the annual meeting. Set in the by-laws, this meeting is held the first Friday in June. This year the meeting will therefore be held on Friday June 4. The major purpose



of the meeting will be the election of officers and board members and the review and approval of the Club budget as further described in the by-laws. Traditionally, following the annual meeting is the Installation dinner where new officers are installed. The date for this has not yet been set, but normally occurs before the end of the fiscal year on June 30. New officers and board members take office July 1 and serve to the following June 30.

I hope this makes the important business of the club a bit more transparent. If you are interested in serving in an elected position at the club please feel free to discuss it with any of the officers or board members. You should also check the by-laws as there are some pre-requisites for certain positions.

U\$ Sailing Small Boat Instructor Program

The Coconut Grove Sailing Club hosted its annual Level One Small Boat Instructor Certification Course the last weekend in March and the first weekend in April. It is a very dynamic 40 hour course that teaches basic teaching skills, class control and motivation and certifies power/safety boat handling skills and sailing ability. The main motivation for holding the course at the club is to certify our own instructors and keep the

quality and safety of our programs high,

but it is an opportunity for instructors from other clubs to do the same. This is our 10th year presenting this program.

uch of the CGSC history is preserved in a history file, a collection of Channels, reports, newspaper clippings etc. maintained by the office going back to the 1945 meetings at the Coconut Grove Elementary School. This picture of Peter Branning is from a June 1964 Channel

Peter recalls that Junior CGSC members were a slightly different breed in those days. Life was a bit more.... how would you say it..."unstructured"? There were great wars out on the bay between Kurt's "Cayo Nina", Cai's "Noel" and Charlie's "Spindrift" sailing past one another throwing buckets of water (hopefully to leeward) We went snorkeling and spear fishing in the mooring area which was full of fish, and took off for days in the Keys with no adult supervision. Our most sophisticated diving apparatus was two bicycle pumps hooked up to fifty feet of garden hose. CGSC had its own football team which took on pick-up teams from the local schools in rough and tumble games in the park. Robert Clarington was our chuckling conspirator and we were always on the edge of trouble with the Board Members.

Yet our notion of mischief was a pretty harmless version of what you see going on today. For example, the great 1962 junior member caper of painting the anchor on McFarlane was high level intrigue and serious criminal conspiracy requiring lots of planning (timing the police rounds) surveillance and scheduling (of what senior members were at the CGSC that night) and raw guts and courage (I picked out the colors - pink with black polka dots.) Somehow though, we all graduated high school and went off into the world with great memories, a keen sense of good fun, and no criminal records of any real significance. Ahhh yes...those were the days.

View from the Signal Boat

ebruary 2010 was a very busy month for the Coconut Grove Sailing Club Race Committee. The 41st Comodoro Rasco Snipe Regatta was held on February 6-7. PRO Jaime Ramon



conducted races for the 2 days for 25 entrants. First place went to Miamians Brian Kamilar and Enrique Quintero. The 'Old Man', Sr. Diaz, ably handled the Trophy Presentations and led all with the La Bamba ceremony.

February 19th and 20th found the Club hosting the Second Regatta in the Melges 20 Miami Winter Regatta Series. The Melges 20 crews were on the Bay on Friday for practice sailing and registration at the Club. Our Race Committee team ran the 20's races on Saturday and Sunday for the 14 registered participants.

On Saturday, February 27th, the CGSC Race Committee stepped in to assist our neighbors up the street, Biscayne Bay Yacht Club, in running the Barnacle's Washington's Birthday Regatta. Eighteen classic sailboats, including Sharpies, Mud Hens, Marsh Hens, Bay Hens and a 14 foot Bahamian Dingy, were registered. The weather threatened all day but we were able to get 3 races in for the fleet before the heavens opened. Everyone met back at the Barnacle for Trophy presentation and a Chowder Party.

March 10th to 13th was the Third and final Regatta in the Melges 20 Miami Winter Regatta Series, run in conjunction with the new Bacardi Miami Sail Week. The 20's were joined by their larger sibling, the Melges 24. A total of 13 Melges 20 and 8 Melges 24 enjoyed 3 days of racing.

March 19th to 21st will find the CGSC Race Committee working the 44th Annual Don Q Snipe Regatta. As a qualifier for the Snipe Nationals, we expect over 50 entrants for the 3 days of racing.

The Coconut Grove Sailing Club Race Committee is always looking for new recruits. There are many job requirements for every race or regatta, both on shore and on the Bay. Sailing experience is helpful but not required. We have both classes on shore and coaching on the water to train our volunteers. before retiring in Race 7 with a more than good enough score to win the Melges 20 regatta. In the 24's, Convexity and Blur had excellent results and finished 1-2 for the

regatta, with Guy Mossman in third.

For the Inaugural Audi Melges 20 Miami Winter Series, which also included the first two regattas in December and February, it was an easy win for Jeff Ecklund who took every regatta. Eric Wynsma finished

As most readers of The Channel know by now, Coconut Grove Sailing Club is playing host to the Inaugural Audi Melges 20 Miami Winter Series. This series consists of three regattas for this new one-design class. The first was a highly successful regatta in December, the second was



over the February 20-21 weekend, and the finale is Bacardi Miami Sailing Week, March 11-13.

For the February event, 14 of these hot boats were registered. The boats were accommodated by rafting off the Strip Dock and taking available moorings in our mooring field. This enthusiastic group seemed very happy to escape the cold and

snow up north in the Great Lakes and East Coast areas of the country to come to Miami for a nice weekend of sailing. Again, the regatta started with a Skippers Meeting and party with live band on Friday evening, February 19th at the Club.

Saturday morning dawned essentially windless. With the best wind forecast information available, the Race Committee put the fleet on harbor postponement waiting for the wind to fill in. Finally, the sea breeze began to develop, and a start occurred around 1500 hours. Two light air, but quality races were sailed, with hopes pinned on a better wind forecast for Sunday. After the Saturday racing, the Class held a "press conference" type de-brief of the day's sailing. There was a panel of 5-6 expert racers to which intense attention was paid by the assembled crowd of 30 or

so skippers and crews. CGSC hosted a regatta dinner Saturday evening, with new Chef Tara Abrams providing an excellent offering of beef, fish, chicken, potatoes, veggies, salad and Key Lime Pie. There were compliments from the racers.

In anticipation of a better breeze on Sunday, the Race Committee advanced the time of the first Warning Signal from 1100 to 1000. Sure enough, there was a sailable breeze at that hour, and an on-time Race 3 was conducted. Three additional races were sailed, bringing the regatta back to the scheduled six race format. Ft. Lauderdale's Jeff Ecklund followed up his tie-break win in the first regatta in December with a more convincing four point win in Event No. 2. Second, again, was Eric Wynsma of Michigan. Another Michigander, Michael Kiss, made a huge step from December's results to finish 3rd, followed by Erwyn Naidoo of Toronto, Canada and Mary Ann Ward of Cocoa Beach, FL.

The Melges 20's launch, haul and store at Shake-a-Leg

Miami, so the trophy presentation was again up there Sunday afternoon. Anne Edwards of our RC did an excellent job of setting up the presentation and providing appetizers, etc. for the racers. Adult Sailing

ositive developments are still in the news from your Adult Sailing Committee. In addition to continued strong support from our officers, board, staff and members, enrollment in the Adult Sailing programs available at CGSC continues good growth. The following opportunities for students to learn or increase new skills remain available:

Adult Learn-to-Sail - This is a two-day course taught on the popular Sunfish sailboat and is normally the second weekend of each month. Adults learn to sail on a boat by themselves along with students on additional boats. Class size is up to ten (10) students.


Basic Keelboat - This is a US Sailing certification series course, taught twice each month on the second and third weekends. Class size is up to three (3) students and is taught on the classic Ensign keelboat. No prerequisite courses are required before taking this course.

Basic Keelboat Certification - Students completing the Basic Keelboat course satisfactorily may apply to be tested for US Sailing Basic Keelboat certification. Experienced sailors may also challenge this test without taking the Basic Keelboat course. Tests are scheduled individually for each applicant.

Weekly Sunfish Clinic - This weekly three hour clinic is a fun, learning experience for Sunfish sailors who have completed the Learn-to-Sail course or have sufficient experience to participate. Students learn and practice a new skill each week, followed by several short, fun races to measure skill growth. Held on Thursdays, cool weather schedule is 9AM to Noon. From April through September, clinics are held from 4PM to Sunset.

Monthly Small Boat Clinic - Normally held on the fourth (4th) Sunday of each month this is a 9Am to 3PM fun sail to a nearby sandbar for lunch, socializing, swimming and just enjoying a day on the Bay with other small boat sailors. Students and qualified members may use our Sunfish, plus all members with small boats (even keelboats) are invited. On the return from the sandbar, most participate in a fun "drag race". At the close, most participants debrief on the club verandah with a

Before this article is published, CGSC will have sponsored a three (3) day US Sailing Basic Keelboat Instructor Evaluation. We are expecting to get additional keelboat instructors from members who are participating in this serious, professional level class.

In February and early March, a US Sailing Level 1 (dinghy) Instructor course was hosted by Bud Price. We expect to be getting some additional help from members Javier Prado and Phil Adams who took this course. We have some good opportunity to grow our programs, and a team of certified instructors is essential to that success.

Have you noticed our sharp looking, recently hauled fleet of Ensign keelboat trainers? Both PAT and FOUNDATION are getting second looks and looking good on the Bay with their freshly painted topsides, new stripes and painted bottoms.
