BACK-TO-BACK INTERNATIONAL REGATTAS AT CGSC

oconut Grove Sailing Club hosted two international regattas on consecutive weeks at the end of January and early February. First was the annual Miami Olympic Classes Regatta where we again ran the racing circle and provided the shore base for the Men's and Woman's RS:X windsurfers. Then, right on the heels of that was the 29erXX Seiko Superbowl Regatta for these hot new skiffs.

The two fleets represented existing and potential future Olympic classes. Olympic sailing veterans and contenders raced in both regattas. Each regatta started off on a slow note due to weather as the Boards were shut out the first day, and the 29erXX's were limited to one race. After that, it was all good both weeks.

Europeans Dominate CGSC's Miami OCR

Thirty-seven men and twenty-five women entered the regatta, representing 19 countries! After the first day shut out, CGSC's RC ran two races per day for the remaining four days for both the Men's and Women's fleets. Saturday's Medal Race for the top ten in each class concluded the regatta.

In non-planing conditions (below 15 knots), the

Board sailors do a lot of pumping to get around the course. After two races, they are required to have an hour's shore rest. Adding the transit time to and from our Alpha Circle near Quick Flash made it virtually impossible to get in three races per day to catch up. We had reasonable wind and very good racing all four

VICE COMMODORE REPORT

acing season is here! That means exciting weekend events including the recently completed Olympic Classes Regatta for which CGSC hosted the RS:X sailboards, the 29er regatta, and the Melges 20 Winter Regatta Series. Coming the week of March 8 we will be hosting the third and final regatta of the Melges series. We are expecting a large number of boats, as we will have both the 20's and 24's at CSC for this event. In addition this regatta is part of the Bacardi Miami Sailing Week, which includes the historic Star class Bacardi Cup, as well as racing for the Melges, Vipers and J24's. Wednesday March 10 CGSC will be hosting one of the Miami Sailing Week parties – with over 200 people expected to attend.

First let me say we are very happy to be hosting these special events. The fact that we have attracted these regattas to the CGSC means that the racing community respects the ability of our race committee to manage the events and the ability of our club to be a good host. Of course, these events are also closely aligned with the mission of the CGSC to "encourage the sport of sailing". They are also beneficial to the economy of the Coconut Grove business community and the City of Miami.

That said I understand these events also lead, in some instances, to frustration, in regard to general access to our facilities, and particularly in regard to parking and loading. The most difficult times occur when there is racing on Saturdays, at the same time we have our youth learn-to-sail and racing programs, adult programs, and often, larger numbers of members using the facilities. So, with some 150 boats on moorings, another 35 or so on the strip, numerous visitors coming to the club, and some 48 parking spaces, it is easy to see that on a busy Saturday with all those activities going on, not everyone wishing to come to the club, including members with parking stickers, will be able to find a parking space.

Our intent is to manage the parking to maximize accessibility for all our user groups, and minimize the frustration. For example on Monday's when the club facilities are closed,

had the breakout performance of the regatta



we have, in the past allowed regatta participants to use the CGSC parking lot. It is also worth noting that for groups that regularly use our meeting room, such as the Coconut Grove Rotary Club, we typically allow participants to park in the CGSC lot. We have found that there are few if any instances when that has created a parking problem. However,



as our activities, sailing programs and racing events grow, parking will become a larger management issue. In spite of the difficulties this may create it is a good problem to have, as it is a measure of our success.

Moving forward we will likely have to issue a specific parking plan for each regatta or other large special event, to ensure that the participants know the situation before they head to our facility. There are over 700 public parking spaces within a quarter mile of the club – we just need to inform our members and guests where they are. We will also likely try out some new measures to reserve sections of the lot for drop off and loading. So, please bear with us as we develop new management practices to address this issue.

nly positive items to report from your Adult Sailing Committee. There are many training activities conducted at the club during the first quarter, sometimes creating competition for classroom space and boats, however, working with others and a few schedule adjustments has assured continuity in our classes, clinics and related activities for our adult sailors. In the next four weeks, we have two weeks of Mariners School, two weekends of US Sailing small boat instructor training and evaluation and a three day weekend of US Sailing evaluation for potential Basic Keelboat instructors.

Of our five adult programs, only our Learn-to-Sail Sunfish course has seen some decline in attendance, and that happens annually due to what some would call the "cold" water. Come on, sailors....., the water is warming up now and the capsize drill only takes about a minute.

Basic Keelboat classes continue to fill with more and more students taking the next step and testing for Basic Keelboat Certification. The race course for the Boards was the most complicated that our Race Committee has ever been called upon to handle. It was a trapezoid course used to separated the two fleets during the racing. However, this time a slalom mark field was added at the end of the trap. A total of ten marks and four support boats were required.

The USA continues to have difficulty competing in the Boards. The top US Man was Ben Barger who finished 14th, while the top US Woman was Farrah Hall in 18th. European Men took six of the top ten places, with the other four representing Israel, Argentina, Cyprus and Japan. Among the Women, the top nine were European. Spain was especially strong, recording a close second in the Men, and first and second in the Women.

We were delighted to have John Craig return as Principal Race Officer for our Alpha Circle. John is the professional Race Manager at St. Francis YC in San Francisco, and is also a member of the USSailing Board of Directors. The Signal Boat was Carl and Mercedes Updyke's Gemini 34 cat, Cool Obsession. Mako 2 was the Mark Boat with Art Auwaerter as Skipper, along with Kit Temple, Jim Waldron and Past Commodore Larry Whipple. We were very happy to receive support boat assistance from our neighboring clubs. This included Two Dogs II with Rick Bertold and Bruce Harper, Grace Meredith with Don Poole, and Lowedown with John Lowe. Crewing on these boats were Dennis Jansma. Anne Edwards, Susan Walcutt, Dottie Rostorfer, Bernie Meier, Scott Findley and Alan Mercer. The Signal Boat crews included Ron Rostorfer, Vicki Rosenbloom, Karen Young and Jo Ann Mathieu. CGSC Hosts First 29erXX Regatta

GSC's Race Committee was right back at it two days after the OCR with a practice race followed by a three day 29erXX Seiko Superbowl Regatta. Nine teams participated in this inaugural event. All together, ten races were sailed in a variety of conditions.

These boats are basically 29er's with a taller, two-spreader rig and trapezes for both crew and skipper. It's a smaller version of the Men's 49er Olympic Class. These "skiffs" are very exciting to sail, and the goal of the 29erXX Class is to become the Olympic Women's high performance dinghy, in parallel with the Men's 49er.

The first day, just like the previous Monday with the OCR, turned out to have weather problems. One quality race was sailed, but then the wind died. It finally came in from the west with storm clouds looming, so the RC abandoned. The fleet was caught in the rain and some gusty conditions in our mooring field on the way in.

Tuesday saw light SE winds. Five races were sailed, getting back one of the lost races from the day before. Then, Wednesday, a hard NNE wind greeted the racers, and four excellent races were sailed bringing the total to the planned ten races.

The top team of Australia's Hannah Nattrass with US Olympian Graham Biehl crewing put on an outstanding performance, winning seven of the ten races. Two drop races were allowed, so they counted the seven firsts and a second. As an indication of how demanding these skiffs are, even this team capsized trying to restart after an OCS call. Despite the lost time, they still recovered to nip two other boats at the finish and place second

in the race! Francisco Piccini and Sofia Tedin of Argentina took second, while the Italian team of two-time Olympian skipper Giulia Conti with Alessandra Angelini crewing finishing third.

CGSC's Race Committee did another fine job on the water. Ken Batzer of BBYC brought Bill and Jill Smoak's Robalo to be Signal Boat on Monday, with our Henry Bernstein's Hunter 34 Ivory Gull taking over for the remaining two days. Signal Boat crew was PRO Ron Rostorfer, Vicki Rosenbloom, Anne Edwards, Jo Ann Mathieu and visitor Jerelyn Biehl of San Diego. Up to windward on Mako 2 was Skipper Bill Stites with Kit Temple, Scott Findley, Cliff Biddle and Jim Waldron. Grace Meredith with Don Poole skippering was the Pin Boat, with crews Alan Mercer, Art Auwaerter, Holly Biddle and Barry Simmons.

The top 10 sailors from each fleet then went on to compete on Saturday, January 30, in the medal races. The young American sailor, Kyle Rogachenko, who was the overall winner in CGSC's Orange Bowl Regatta at the end of December, 2009, placed third in the Saturday races, winning him a spot on the US Men's Olympic Team.
