2010 Don Q Snipe Regatta

Orty-seven Snipes came to the City of Miami and Biscayne Bay to race in the 44th Annual Don Q Rum Keg Snipe Regatta. The event is hosted by the Coconut Grove Sailing Club and Miami Snipe Fleet 7 and is sponsored annually by the Don Q Rum Destileria Serralles, Inc. This was a great international event with teams from Norway, Sweden, Finland, Italy, Brazil, Canada and Puerto Rico.

On Friday, Snipers waited for over an hour for the breeze to kick in. The first race was started after one general recall with a prep flag start at 1331. The course was a Windward Leeward course with a downwind finish. The breeze was at 5.8 kts from 325 degrees. As the breeze increased and changed direction we increased the second windward leg and signaled a change to starboard as the breeze was now at 0 degrees. The breeze stayed constant from 0 degrees until the last 8 boats were finishing when it shifted to 160 degrees sending those few boats on a beat to a downwind finish. Henry and Christian Filter won race 1. The right side paid off big and Ernesto Rodriguez had a good lead only to be run down by the Filters at the downwind finish in a dying breeze. The second race was started at 14:54 under better conditions as the wind was now at 9.7 kts from 160 degrees. The course was once again a course W with a downwind finish. As the winds continued increasing the second weather leg was increased to 1.0 nm providing for some additional great sailing. Ernesto Rodriguez won race 2.

Saturday started with a light breeze of 8kts from 120 degrees and a slightly more aggressive fleet. The first attempt to start race three resulted in a general recall. The restart was a Z Flag start with no boats receiving penalties. The course was a course W. The wind which remained at 120 degrees decreased to 6 kts which resulted in the shortening of the leg from 1 nm to .8 nm. Race four was a Windward Leeward course with a downwind finish.

VICE COMMODORE REPORT

s planned, it is time for our semi-annual moorings inspection, which should be well underway by the time you read this article. This effort, led by our moorings chairman Bill Beavers is a very important task that is undertaken every six months. The purpose is to make sure that all the club moorings are in good condition and capable of holding our boats firmly in place especially during high winds. The inspection process involves divers going into the water and checking every fitting, line and link of chain on each of the 196 moorings that are in service. It is amazing how corrosion and stress can wear down the heavy galvanized chain that we use to secure the pennants to the mooring itself, hence the need for our frequent inspections. As required, fittings and chain are replaced. As part of this process we will also be reviewing the placement of boats and moorings to ensure that every boat has an appropriate water depth and swing room.

With mooring inspections underway it is also a good time to start thinking about hurricane season which is only a month and a half away. As we all know, but it is worth reminding, our moorings are not structurally capable of holding our boats in-place in hurricane force winds. It is also worth pointing out that while you may have heard that screw – down moorings (as opposed to the dead-weight moorings at CGSC) can resist hurricane force winds, the hurricanes of 2004/2005 proved that even that type of mooring does not guarantee safety. Therefore, we all have to be prepared to move our boats to safer locations in the event of a hurricane heading for Miami. Please check your moorings agreement to better understand the specific requirements for club members.

While moving our boats is definitely not a fun day on the

That is the great thing about our club – members helping each other through the tough times – and enjoying our company during the good times. If you are new to the club or owning a boat, look for our Hurricane Safety Seminars that the club will be offering in the coming months. These free events are open to the public at no charge and give participants valuable information about useful / necessary equipment and how to prepare your boat to survive a hurricane event. Also feel free to ask another member about their equipment, plans and experience in hurricanes and tropical storms. Sharing our knowledge and experience is a key part of the CGSC mission and experience.

The breeze was now at 140 degrees however the first attempt to start resulted in a general recall and Z flag penalties to various competitors. The second attempt was successful despite a few OCS. The legs were set at 1 nm. Brian Kamilar and Enrique Quintero did a great job and won both races.

Race 5 on Sunday started in a brisk 16kts of breeze from 155 degrees. The fleet was sent on an Olympic course with 1.20 nm legs. The breeze dissipated to 9 kts resulting in a shortening of the windward leg to .9nm. Further decreases in the breeze resulted in the shortening of the downwind leg to .6 nm. As the breeze continued to decrease the last upwind leg was reduced to .5nm. The race was finished within the time limit with 7 minutes to spare however an error in the signaling of a course change at the weather mark resulted in a request for redress which outcome was the throwing out of the 5th race by the judges' panel. It was unfortunate since the Race Committee did a stellar job in changing marks during the races and setting courses and monitoring starts all regatta. That is sailboat racing!

hoy all, another busy month of sailing activities for both youth and adult sailing. Last time we talked we were on the verge of traveling to Jensen Beach for The Spring Opti Festival at the US Sailing Center in Martin County. Let me just say that particular regatta was one of my proudest moments since I signed on four years ago. Conditions for the regatta started out a little cold and wet (as usual every time we visit there) but turned out to be spectacular. The 5 kids that attended were all anxious to get started as wind predictions were forecast to pick up over 15 knots, and that can be a little intimidating for the Greener Green Fleeters. After the skippers meeting on Saturday we were off to the course for the first warning to start racing. There were 16 boats registered for Green Fleet and during the first day of racing it was crystal clear that CGSC was THE force to be reckoned with. With winds picking up as predicted I began to see more and more boat bottoms and dagger boards sticking up in the air and after getting in six races all the kids looked as if they "were road hard and put up wet". After getting everyone back on shore to begin the process of washing down, de-rigging ,and put all the gear away for the night, Jose Dapena, two of the kids on our race team's Dad announced "Barbeque at my hotel tonight at 6:30". Jose who is one of our most dedicated parents, and who is also very much liked by all in our group, and who is also a guy you really don't want to say "no" to. So it was all set, party at Jose's tonight.

After arriving back at our hotel it was time to hit the showers and get ready for some much needed R&R. Mike McHugh (our Green Fleet coach) and I arrived at the prescribed time to find that it was a great turnout, all of our kids and their parents were in attendance. Upon arrival both Mike and I were handed the customary adult beverage and began the task of unwinding and relaxing. The schedule was to get in six additional races so the kids could get two "throw outs" and improve on their already impressive



standings. As the day progressed so did the winds and I once again started to see more of those telltale boat bottoms and sky aimed dagger boards and I could tell that they were getting ready to wrap it up for the day. After completing 12 races in two days it was finally time to see how we did, and we did extremely well. Out of the five kids racing in Green Fleet all five were awarded prizes, the standings are as follows: Jose Dapena, 1st place, Santiago Holz, 2nd place, Max Gold, 3rd place, Alejandro Holz, 4th place, And what I consider the most prestigious award: Andres Dapena, "The Wettest Sailor", for hanging in there for 12 races and being upside down almost as much as being right side up! This was Andres' first regatta and he actually placed 12th out of 16 boats, quite an accomplishment for a young man who only weighs about 50 pounds in winds over 15 knots.

The awards ceremony was one I will never forget as I saw all of those blue CGSC rash guards standing in a row, a proud moment to say the least. I'm including some photos of this regatta for all to see.

With the Spring Opti Fest now in the record books it was time to get back to reality and get ready for our next event, The Fourth Annual Rotary Club Of Coconut Grove's Spring Break Camp & Regatta on the 29th of March thru the 1st of April, This regatta's theme is "Kids Helping Kids" and is a fundraiser to help kids who couldn't otherwise afford to learn to sail. This year we raised \$4500, which will go right back into our local community in the form of scholarships for summer camp. This year was our biggest to date with 25 kids in attendance learning, racing and having fun with the last day being an actual regatta with race committee scoring the event. This year we had four different classes, Beginner (first time sailors), Opti Green Fleet, Opti Red, White, & Blue and Lasers, racing on two different courses with the Beginner group being scored right off the dock here in our harbor. After the final day of racing it was time for a barbeque and awards.

There were three trophies for each division and participation awards and t-shirts for all participants.

Immediately following the Spring Break Camp & Regatta it was off to the Key Biscayne Yacht Club for the Southeast Dinghy Championships on the very next day. Another thing I'm very proud of is the re-launch of CGSC's Laser team. We currently have 8 enrolled in this program with a 4 time Cuban National Laser Champion, "Koky" Gutierrez as their coach who has taken this team to new levels since we began. Although for most of the sailors on our team this is their first year in Laser's, Koky has done a stellar job bringing them into top ten finishes in almost every event we've visited, and this regatta was not the exception with two of our sailors placing in the top ten.

Another first for CGSC was this year's "private school" spring break camp which we did the week of March 5th thru the 9th. The two schools that we hosted were Belen and Our Lady of Lourdes Academy, with a total of eight students. These were all first time sailors and under Koky's guidance had a great week of learning and fun. Look for their story in the edition as I've asked them to put a little something together describing their experience here at CGSC.

With this sailing season coming to an end, that can only mean one thing, SUMMER CAMP!!! The dates for this year's camp are already up on our website, along with all the necessary forms for parents to send in to secure a spot in what I'm sure will be "Our Best Summer Yet". As with years past we will be running a total of 5 two week sessions beginning in June and ending in August. This is the fourth consecutive year that we haven't increased our cost for camp; we always want to be known as the affordable place to sail, for both youth and adults.

I know that this is a long one but remember, I warned you that we've been busy...
