VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT

**CGSC is the perfect spot to spend a lazy evening with your family and friends right under the Peacock Park fireworks display. Lauren and her staff did a fantastic job keeping us all well fed and hydrated as well. At summer camp the next day you wouldn't have had the faintest idea of all of the folks that were there on the lawn the previous day with the ensuing monsoon which barely waited until after the fireworks finished.

Hurricane season is officially here with a practice run during Tropical Storm Chantal. I hope you all have a firm plan in place and have all of your supplies for this season. We have made some changes to the hurricane policy this year so as to eliminate confusion as to when to evacuate or batten down. Our plans are now tied directly to the National Hurricane Center's watches and warnings. As a storm approaches we will start issuing notifications via e-mail, social media and bulletin board posts. If a tropical storm or hurricane watch is issued we will begin shuttle service. This is moved up from previous years to give skippers more time to evacuate before the storm nears. The Coral Gables police will allow boats to tie up in the waterways starting with a storm watch. All boats must be removed within 48 hours of the watch or warning being lifted.

Please note that it is up to each skipper individually to judge when to secure or move his vessel. All boat

owners should monitor weather forecasts and NHC advisories, and be prepared to execute their tropical storm and hurricane plans. Do NOT rely on CGSC emails or announcements to take steps needed to secure your vessels and to comply with



CGSC mooring and rental agreements. An upgrade to a NHC hurricane watch requires you to remove your vessel from the mooring field within 24 hours. If you plan to be out of town, make arrangements for the event of a storm while you are gone.

Meanwhile, while summer camp activity keeps our days filled through the summer, the Crow's Nest can offer a cool respite and a nice bite! Let Jeff, Dennis, Daniel or Sarah make you a special drink after a hot day of sailing.

It is my pleasure to serve as your Vice Commodore this year. As usual, please let me know "the good, the bad and the ugly". We want the CGSC member experience to be excellent and fulfilling for all.
