50th CGSC OPEN ORANGE BOWL REGATTA

BOWL on a ROLL!

CGSC hosted its 50th Open Orange Bowl Regatta over the December Holidays, and it was a very successful event. This was our Club's second year of an expanded Open Orange Bowl format including not just the traditional adult Lasers, but also the "no age restriction" International 420's and 29ers. All in all, 66 boats competed – very close to the 72 racing last year. CGSC has always been proud to be a part of the Orange Bowl festivities, and the Orange Bowl Committee had urged us to expand our event.

Our Classes. As background, the I-420's and 29ers are Olympic development boats sailed by youngsters in the 15-22 (or so) age bracket. Once these folks

get a bit bigger and older, they transition into the actual Olympic Classes, the International 470, the Men's 49er and now the new Women's 49erFX. This makes an interesting contrast with our Laser fleet where over half the fleet is Masters! All told, our fleet came from 11 States and five foreign countries.



The Racing. Things actually got off to a bit of a slow start on Thursday Dec. 27th with a postponement on shore due to light winds. However, conditions improved later in the afternoon, and two races were sailed. Relatively light but very sailable conditions

prevailed on Friday, with an additional three races sailed, so things were on schedule. An approaching

REAR COMMODORE'S REPORT

Well another sailing season has flown by and the youth team is really developing into an exciting bunch this year. As the winter session begins I have several things to report.

With new Laser coach Hernan Peralta, the kids have taken to practicing straight from the club to the ocean. This is great practice when considering the conditions they will meet when they arrive at the Ft. Lauderdale Yacht Club's Boomerang Regatta later this month. There is an underlying excitement in the OPTI divisions as well after Theo Quenee's and Sebastian Riquelme's trophies in the Orange Bowl in Dec. In general all of the kids performed exceptionally well this fall at seven different regattas, both in and out of town.

Youth sailing is fundamental to the basic mission of CGSC which is teaching people to sail and building the sport as a life-long family pastime. With this in mind the youth sailing committee and chairs have been working closely with Sailing Director Nick to develop and refine our youth mission, vision and objectives. This will resolve in a new "user manual" which will help us focus and measure our goals and accomplishments. A rough draft is being refined and we trust that it will be ready for presentation within one month. Number one on the list is increasing the amount of coaching staff and fine tuning their curriculum. The Youth sailing teams and summer camps have enjoyed a tremendous success in the past year. We are looking to keep that momentum going by improving the coaching standards and competitiveness with the older OPTI and Laser kids and giving them more challenges, successes and accomplishments. We also have implemented a separate travel team option for the kids so that we can provide better support at home for the ones who do not wish to travel. With this we are adding a Wednesday racing practice for the advanced OPTIs and a Sunday practice for the Lasers. We also have a great OPTI coaching staff going into the second session with Green fleet coach Stephanie Seoane, Assistant coach Patrick Arrington and seasoned coach Maykel Alonso focusing more on the Red, White and Blue fleets in the coming months.

On another youth sailing note, we have sadly lost the support of the Rotary Club's spring break

sponsorship. We thank them for their sponsorship over the years. Having said that and while time is short, we have most of the elements in place from the Halloween Howler and our plans are to work on re-tooling it as a CGSC Youth fundraising event.

We hope to use this to help with equipment purchases towards building the team as mentioned as well as giving our youth something fun to do over spring break. The time is now for getting this off the ground so we are looking for volunteers who can assist in regatta organization and shore side activities. It is a one day regatta preceded by a 3 day clinic that takes place during Public schools spring break. The Regatta is on the 28th of March and the camp/clinic is held on the preceding three days March 25th-27th.

The Coconut Grove Art's Festival is back on Feb 16th – 18th. Why not come and celebrate not only art but sailing! We will be open all weekend and keeping the bar open on that Monday. Booth volunteers are always welcome to promote what we do and the club is a great oasis in the middle of all of the festival chaos.

The Washington's Birthday Regatta at the Barnacle will bring some interesting history to the bay on Saturday February 23rd with the CGSC Race committee managing the race and many activities that should interest our member and highlight our common history. In addition we will be sponsoring the "Chowder Dinner" this year.

Those high performance “skiffs” were flying down the course. So, ten races completed for the Lasers and I-420’s, 11 for the 29ers.



Shore-side. The sailors had a good time ashore, as well. CGSC hosted our two traditional dinners, the BBQ on Thursday night and the



“Floribbean Dinner” complete with prize drawing on Saturday night. Both were excellent meals – thanks to Chef Ritchie, GM Adam Young and Office Manager Lauren Simpson for their efforts. The Lasers enjoyed a complementary keg after racing each day – in view of the advanced age of some in the fleet! Thanks to Richard and Maryann Etkin, our Shore-side Chairs and their staff for another excellent job, and to Club Staff Nick Mansbach, Duane Smallwood, the two Kyle’s(!) and others in the Dock Office for their help.

Results. When the spray settled, it was clear there had been some outstanding demonstrations of sailing skill covering a wide variety of conditions. In the 26-boat Laser fleet, young Robert Davis from Kingston, ON scored a very convincing win sailing a consistent series. He was first or second in seven of the ten races and won by 13 points over Ricardo Montemayor from Vancouver, BC. Those of us who have watched Robert sail (and grow!) over the past few years knew this day would come! Mathew Ryder of Toronto was three points back in third, cementing a Canadian sweep. CGSC’s Ernesto Rodriguez tied for 4th on points but settled for 5th in the tie-breaker.

However, for the Laser Masters, Ernesto scored a convincing win. CGSC’s Augie Diaz was second, and long-time Open OB Laser competitor Roman Plutenko (originally from the Ukraine, but now in Chicago) took third.

The I-420’s were also sailing for their North American Championship. Another very convincing win was

recorded by Jack Parkin and Ben Saxton from CT. They were first or second in eight of the ten races in this 18-boat fleet, winning by 19 points over Wade Waddell and Henry Fernberger of Larchmont YC, NY. Wade and Henry also won the Junior trophy for both sailors being 18 or under. Casey Klingler and Fiona Walsh of Larchmont were third, and won the Women’s trophy.

In the 22-boat 29er Class, competition was very keen. Quinn and Dane Wilson of Santa Barbara YC, CA sailed an excellent series, winning six of the 11 races to take home the first place trophy. However, what really drove home the point is that Quinn and Dane also won the Junior trophy! Holy cow, watch out for this team in the future! Right on their transom just five points back were Campbell D’Eliscu and Conner Kelter from Newport Harbor YC, CA. Their worst race counted was a fourth! Nic Muller and Kai Friesecke from nearby Lauderdale YC were third.
