Melges 32's Return to Miami & CGSC

B ackground. After being AWOL from Miami in 2013 when they went to the BVI, the International Melges 32's returned to Miami Beach Marina for their Miami Winter Regatta, Feb. 28-Mar. 2. CGSC once again served as the Host

Club for the event, and our Race Committee conducted the racing which occurred as usual in the ocean east of Key Biscayne. CGSC had hosted two prior Melges 32 regattas back in March of 2011 and 2012.

The Winter Regatta was the first of four Melges 32 regattas that CGSC will host in 2014.

The Spring Challenge is April 4-6, and then in the fall, it's the Gold Cup in November and the World Championships in December. Quite a program for our little Club! 13 boats raced in this first event, but expectations are that the fleet will build back to the high-20's we've seen in the past. Good regattas

help with this, and we're off to an excellent start.

<u>The Racing.</u> Winds were light to moderate throughout the Winter Regatta, with mostly bright and sunny conditions. Races were completed on schedule, with three each on Friday and Saturday

with the remaining two on Sunday. The breeze built during the event, with the best air for Sunday's first race. Racing was very close, as is normal for the class, although there were some serious leads from time to time. To show how close it was, Jason Carroll's team aboard ARGO won all three races

on Saturday, an incredible feat, but at the end of the day, still trailed Roberto Tomasini Grinover's Robertissima by a point. Robertissima had sailed a very consistent series with a 2-1-4-2-2-4 posting, dropping a 4th as their worst score for 11 points. ARGO had a 6-3-7-1-1, dropping the 7th for 12 (continued on 4)

Sign up in the office ahead of time and don't forget to make sure your ground tackle has enough chain and rode. As usual there will be a designated anchorage just south of the Boca



Chita harbor entrance, but be aware of the shallows between the two. We will be running launch service between the anchorage and seawall but not tow service so make sure you update your yearly towing memberships. However, they staged a terrific recovery to take second at the finish, passing ARGO in the process that ended up 4th. So, now ARGO not only needed to beat Robertissima in Race 8, they had to put two boats in between. Robertissima seemed content to follow ARGO around the course, but on the final lap, ARGO was able to put not two, but three boats between with a 3rd place finish to Robertissima's 7th. But wait – that allowed Robertissima to drop the 7th and reinstate the 4th place, giving them the victory by two points. Very exciting to watch unfold.

It was a happy and appreciative crowd of sailors that gathered for the trophy presentation Sunday afternoon. Samba Pa Ti held on to 3rd by two points over Joe Wood's Red and Tony Buckingham's Ngoni. The 13 boat fleet hailed from an astounding eight different countries. As usual, the fleet was replete with America's Cup veterans, Olympic Medalists and World Champions in the crews.

The Regatta was held on Saturday February 22, 2014, under beautiful clear blue skies and perfect winds. This year the Regatta featured three divisions of boats - to improve the competition among the widely different types of vessels. This year included the "Egret", "Plover", and "Sandpiper" divisions, with the Egret division being the fastest boats, Plovers being the Mud Hens and similar types, and the Sandpipers comprised of the Bahamas Dinghies and related boats. Three excellent races were held, and as has happened the past several years the competitors improved their sailing with each race. Winners of each class were Scintilla skippered by Dave Westphal for the Egret Division, Boomer skippered by Miles McDermott for the Plover Division, and Sweet Pea skippered by Jerry Hutton for the Sandpipers.
