Seventy-two sailors entered, and the weather was perfect for fast sailing and fun times. Breakfast was provided each morning, with thanks to Starbucks for the coffee they provided for the adults. The sailors were registered by the shoreside team (Sandrine Quenee, Maria Teresa Loinaz Adams, Jenny Blume, Theo Quenee), each receiving

a Fresh Market bag of instructions and goodies, including a long-sleeve shirt with artwork designed by CGSC's world-famous Adriana Gonzalez. CGSC board member Kathleen Hatfield has to be thanked for finding regatta sponsors.

Before heading out to sea the sailors were

checked-out (by Sue Thompson) to maintain a record of who was out sailing - an excellent safety mechanism. Sailing Director Nick Mansbach did a great job coordinating the boats on dinghy dock.


VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT



LIGHT AIR AT MELGES 32 GOLD CUP

rifteen highly-strung Melges 32 teams gathered at the Miami Beach Station of Coconut Grove Sailing Club (aka Miami Beach Marina!!) for the Class's annual Gold Cup Regatta. It was a farflung fleet hailing from seven different countries, and loaded with big name professional sailing talent.

This was the second of three Melges 32 regattas hosted by CGSC this fall. The Coconut Grove Sailing Club Cup in mid-October was also plagued by light air. With only two races completed, it did not meet the three-race requirement for a regatta. The CGSC Cup was awarded to the highest placing boat in the Gold Cup that also sailed the CGSC Cup Regatta. Next up is the Melges 32 World Championships at the same venue with CGSC again as the host club during the first week of December. CGSC has not hosted a World Championship in modern times! Two more events will follow in February and April for a total of five Melges 32 regattas hosted by CGSC this winter season.

Weather. A strong cold front had played through the weekend before, and winds held in the 20 knot range through Wednesday prior to the Friday start of the regatta. Teams out practicing were going 20 knots downwind under these conditions. Unfortunately, the bottom dropped out. Friday's first day saw light wind which resulted in only two races sailed. Three had been planned for both Friday and Saturday with two more on Sunday for a total of eight.

Saturday's forecast was SE 5-10 knots, i.e., a thermal breeze. Fortunately, there was no weather

system in opposition. So, after a harbor hold and further postponement in the race area east of Key Biscayne, the SE breeze filtered in. Three races were sailed in increasingly better conditions. The fleet didn't get back to the dock until about six o'clock, one of our long-time latest, but it was a good day, bringing the total races sailed to five. One more race, and the competitors could drop their worst race from their score. Two more would be better, and three races Sunday would fulfill the eight-race program.

Sunday's forecast varied daily from SW 5-10 knots to 10-15, back to five knot, then back to 10-15 as a weak low pressure area approached from the Yucatan. However, steady rain was also forecast. We do rain and breeze, but not rain, lightning and breeze or no breeze, and finally not rain, maybe lightning and no breeze. Our Race Committee's first wind-shot of the morning was W 9 knots. All seemed good. However, over the next half hour,

the breeze diminished and went to zero. The rain settled in. Very light breeze was detected from W, NW, NE and S as the day wore on. Finally, in early afternoon, with a 1430 time limit for a race Warning Signal on the last day, Super-Principal Race Officer Anderson Reggio from Newport, RI abandoned racing for the day. The regatta was over. Five races, no drop.

The Racing. The racing was extremely competitive. Only one boat, the regatta winner, avoided a double-digit finish over the five races. Averaging fifth place would have been good enough to win the regatta – a very high number, especially in a fleet of only 15. The final results were interesting, to say the least! The scores from second thru fifth

place were very close – a five point spread among those four boats. However, the winning boat won by a whopping 11 points! An incredible showing! The Melges 32 Class allows a lot of professional sailors to crew, but the owner has to be the helmsman (an "owner-driver" class). One boat owner, an Italian businessman, had injured his arm and the doctors didn't want him racing until the World Championships three weeks hence. The boat and crew were already set for Miami, so he petitioned the Class Association to allow his "good friend" to sail the boat in his absence. That turned out to be a very nice and well-spoken young man named Pierre Casiraghi – he's also the Prince of Monaco! One boat did not participate in the practice racing on Thursday due to rig issues. One boat had its mast down on Thursday, the day before the regatta.

All three of these boats were the same—the Swiss-flagged Robertissima - the runaway winner of the regatta with 15 points in five races. Incredible. We're guessing the problem with the other 14 teams was over-training! Their light-air performance was an amazing 2-3-1-2. Then in Race 5 with the best breeze of the regatta, they finished 7th — almost half their total points for the regatta. After the trophy presentation, CGSC's Regatta Chair was speaking with the boat's professional tactician, Italian Vasco Vascotto. Our Chair said, "We'll see you in three weeks at the World's. I hope we'll have more breeze." Vasco replied, "I'm-a hope-a you don't!"

The top four boats represented four different countries! Second place went to Italian entry

STIG skippered by Alessandro Rombelli with the famous former America's Cupper Terry Hutchinson on tactics, one point better than Japan's Keisuke Suzuki, with Rolex Yachtsman-of-the-Year Bill Hardesty on tactics. Fourth, and winner of the CGSC Cup was Michigan's Dalton DeVos on Delta with US Olympic Gold Medalist Jonathan McKee on tactics.

CGSC's hard-working Race Committee did another great job under adverse circumstances. Up to windward were RC Chair Susan Walcutt's Contender with Race Officer Jaime Ramon, Ryan Alexander and Denise Schneider. Weather Mark 2 was a chartered RIB with PC Ron Rostorfer as Race Officer, operator Debby Ryder and crew Paul Sarvich and Philippe Dusser. The Gate Boat was PC David Kurtz's Robalo with Race Officer Rick Klein and Andi Hoffman.

CGSC's Clearwater was Pin Boat with operators

Julie Hanrahan and Don Poole, Race Officer Mike Dawson, James Leibl, Suzanne Roberts and Esther DiLeo. On the Signal Boat, the 38 foot Blue Yonder, were Skippers Nick Gonzales and Brent Feder, Principal Race Officer Anderson Reggio, Timer Dottie Rostorfer, Recorder Nancy Rogachenko, Flag Signaler Barbara Safiullin, Sounder Helen Phillips from Canada and Scorer Jo Ann Mathieu.

It was a happy crowd of sailors that gathered for the trophy presentation at Monty's Restaurant on the Miami Beach Marina property. Special thanks to Class Administrator Joy Dunigan for her usual incredible efforts to bring about a fine Melges 32 event. Spraying champagne was the order of the event once the awards were presented. Many of the competitors expressed their appreciation for CGSC's role in the event.

ADULT SAILING REPORT

ince our report in last month's CHANNEL, we have had the privilege of awarding five (5) separate US Saiing BASIC KEELBOAT certifications. Four of these were for new members and one for an out-of-state visitor. This is a record for one month, and no small undertaking for the certification applicants. The test takes approximately four hours which consists of an on-water (Practical) examination, which, if successful, is followed by an eighty (80) question written (academic) quiz. When members pass this test and gain certification, they are immediately qualified to participate in the Member-Use program for the Ensigns, as well as they have completed the prerequisite for taking the BASIC CRUISING class and certification, which can be followed by the BASIC BAREBOAT class and certification. Congratulations to those successful sailors. Congratulations also to those new Sunfish member sailors, who have been endorsed for personal use of the Sunfish in our Member-Use

By the time this report reaches you, we will have completed another successful Work Weekend, which includes both operational and cosmetic improvements. Thanks to all those volunteers who show up year after year to help us with these projects. The work accomplished helps us keep

"The Adult Sailing Program will be offering a Bareboat Cruising Class with certification on Jan. 12 to 15. Captain Bruce Penrod, US Sailing Instructor, will be conducting these classes in Leaping Groundhog 2, a Marlow Hunter 40. Cost of the BC Course is \$625 for members and \$725 for non members and there must be at least 3 students as a minimum with a maximum of 6 students. Cost of the BB Course is \$825 for members and \$925 for non members with a minimum of 3 students. This is an overnight class. Basic Keelboat certification is required to get certifications in these two classes. These certifications will also qualify members to use our Beneteau club boats and to charter boats all over the world. 


Boat of the Month - December 2014
