## LARGEST REGATTA EVER AT CGSC

oconut Grove Sailing Club hosted the largest regatta in its history, the CGSC North American Championship Regatta on January 18-20, 2014. This event began back in 2011 when the Club was approached by the Olympic 470 Class, which has both Men's/Mixed and Women's divisions. We were asked to host

their North American's as a lead up to the then Rolex Miami Olympic Classes Regatta, an annual fixture.

Then, last year the Men's Olympic 49er skiffs and new Women's 49er FX skiffs joined in. Racing was conducted on two circles. This year, we were asked by

the USSailing Olympic Coaches to host additional Olympic and Olympic Development Classes. We also did this for December's Open Orange Bowl Regatta.

For the North American's this year, 153 boats representing 26 countries sailed in seven classes on three race circles from three shoreside locations. Truly, this was an international assemblage of Olympic and Olympic Development sailing talent. The regatta was also the second and final US World Youth Qualifier (WYQ) for three

Olympic development classes – International 420's, RS:X Youth W i n d s u r f e r s , and Formula 16 catamarans. The 2014 Youth World Championships are this summer in Portugal.

So, it was a "high calling" for CGSC to step up to the Olympic

Coaches' request and provide this key opportunity for competition. Sailing for their North American Championships were the 470's, I-420's, 49ers, 49erFX's, Nacra 17 catamarans and Formula 16

work on creating the Coconut Grove Waterfront Master Plan. At that time, the Coconut Grove Sailing Club did not have a lease and was renting our facilities on a month to month basis. There was lot of uncertainty regarding the club's future during those years but eventually the City had a Master Plan and through the dedicated hard work of our members and leaders, the club had a lease. Things were back on an even keel.



Two important things we all need to understand about the Master Plan and our lease with the City of Miami are:

- 1. The Master Plan shows the CGSC being housed in a new facility near where Pier Seven of Dinner Key Marina is now.
- 2. Our lease with the City of Miami states: "Lessee agrees to move its operations to a new City facility when the Coconut Grove Master Plan is implemented, so long as the City provides the Lessee with a City owned, waterfront property with like facilities including docks and bears the full cost of the move, provided that moving expenses are deemed to be reasonable."

Last week, the City of Miami hosted a public meeting to discuss the future of Regatta Park and Dinner Key Marina, and I am glad to report that the Coconut Grove Sailing Club was well represented by Officers, Directors and Members. The meeting was described as the first of three public meetings that will be held. The first meeting served to receive public input, the second meeting will serve to summarize all findings and the third meeting will serve to present the results of the public process.

We were all given the opportunity to provide our input and concerns regarding the future plans for Regatta Park and our potential new club house. A short list of those items we shared is:

- 1. Closing Seminole Boat Ramp is paramount to ensure the safety of our sailors. Particularly our youth sailors and beginning adult sailors.
- 2. Any new facilities would have to allow for enough dry storage to accommodate our member's boats as well as visiting boats that participate in the many regattas hosted by the CGSC.
- 3. Ample automobile parking is important.
- 4. The CGSC expects to stay very much involved in the future design of our future facilities.

So, what does this all mean for you and me? Well, one day the CGSC may have to move to a brand new facility that we expect to still overlook our mooring field and will allow us to continue fulfilling our club's mission. The CGSC is its members and as long as we have a united community, the CGSC will thrive. We will however be diligent in monitoring and participating in the planning stages of the Master Plan, and we will ensure that the club's interests are protected.

With that said, let me put one thing into perspective. At the meeting, we were informed that the estimates for constructing the Regatta Park would be in the area of \$26 million for phase one and so far they only had about \$2 million. So unless the City of Miami finds a whole lot of money under a mattress somewhere, this project is not going anywhere real fast, and that means we have time to track the progress while enjoying the club house we all love. If you have questions about our lease and how the Coconut Grove Waterfront Master Plan affects us, please contact me. I will be glad to sit and talk about it with you.

## In Memorium Vladimir L. Stroleny

ith regret we report that our friend, long-time CGSC member and past Rear and Vice Commodore, Vladimir L. Stroleny passed away suddenly on Christmas Day 2013 while skiing with family at Breckenridge, CO. He was 57 and leaves wife Shelley, and grown children Julian, Clayton and Faurest.

Vlad, as he was known, was born and raised in Munich, Germany. He graduated from the University of Miami with a BS in Economics followed with some post graduate studies. He started and ran his own PCnetworks company, and among many other projects was instrumental in setting up the CGSC computer system.

Vlad owned Being There, a Capri 25, for a time, then began racing, handling fore-deck and other things, at which he was very good. He sailed on Finesse, did Bay races, Round the Island, Bimini, Key West and Lime Cup many times. One notable non-race trip was across-state and down the Caloosahatchee River. He raced on other boats and on Blackbird for years, similar races as above. Upon obtaining his Flying Scott Being There, he and crew were very successful "leading the way" in those races. He was the first winner of the new Charlie Fowler trophy for top CGSC Flying Scott in the One Design Regatta.

Vlad was always an active club member, serving as Director as well as RC and VC. He was also very family oriented. His Celebration-of-Life event was held at the CGSC. He will surely be missed by all who knew him.

cats. The RS:X Windsurfers were sailing their US National Championship – Men, Women and Youth divisions. The skiffs and cats lived at the Miami Rowing Club – all 104 of them. "Everybody is here," reported US Olympic Coach Leandro Spina. The 28 470's were at the US Sailing Center, so only the 14 I-420's and 28 Windsurfers were at CGSC.

The first two days were sailed in light to moderate, shifty NW winds.

The number of races varied with the classes, as different race target time lengths were involved. The forecast for the final day was for light SW winds. The wind actually filled in from the WNW. Race courses were laid out just in time for that breeze to be replaced by our normal SE seabreeze. Courses were turned around and racing in the steadiest air of the regatta ensued. That evening, happy sailors from all the classes and venues gathered on the lawn for Chef Richie's outstanding appetizers accompanied by a keg, and the trophy presentation. All in all, they were very appreciative of the Club, the three Race Committees, and the event as a whole.

The three US YWQ classes were heavily US-oriented in terms of the fleets. In the Olympic classes, the US finished 1st and 9th in the Nacra 17 cats, was second and 5th in the Women's 470, and third in the Women's RS:X Boards. The US finished 7th in the 49ers among 31 entries. However, we could only muster a 14th of 18 Men's 470's, a 17th

of 29 49erFX's, and a 7<sup>th</sup> of 11 RS:X Boards. Still, the US did not Medal at the 2012 London Olympics, and "Rome wasn't built in a day." Patience, dedication, training and competition required.

The CGSC Race Committees did an excellent job in conditions that were difficult at times. On the 49er & FX skiffs course, Jon & Carol Ewing's Great Scott was Signal Boat. Canadian National Race Officer Shelley Vaughn was PRO, Mike Dawson from the Tampa area was Deputy, and our Signal Boat crew included Nancy Rogachenko, Jo Ann Mathieu, Maria Elena, Marylinda Ramos, John Kandara and Sicotte Hamilton. Support boats and crews were provided by the USSailing Olympic coaches and led by Luther Carpenter. On the Multihull Circle, our PRO was Carol Ewing. She was assisted by CRYC volunteers and the Coaches led by Leandro Spina.

On the CGSC Circle for the 470's, I-420's and Windsurfers, Henry Bernstein's Ivory Gull and Jim Green's Bali Ha'l

## WORLD CUP HAMPERED BY LIGHT WINDS

an exception or two, Coconut Grove Sailing Club once again hosted the Olympic RS:X Windsurfers for this event. Officially, it's the International Sailing Federation (ISAF) Sailing World Cup Miami. It's one of about four SWC events around the world each year to help prepare sailors from all over the World for the next Olympics – currently, Rio in 2016. For many years, it was called the Rolex Olympic Classes Regatta. Dates were Monday, January 27 – Saturday, February 1, 2014.

CGSC hosted some 28 Men's Boards and 21 Women's Boards at the Club and on our Course Charlie in the Bay for the event. There were five days of fleet racing followed by the Medal Race on Saturday for only the top ten Boards in the Men's and Women's divisions. CGSC's Race Committee handled the fleet racing, but was not involved this year for the Medal Races.

PRO John Craig. Once again, for the seventh time in the past nine years, CGSC welcomed John Craig from San Francisco as our Principal Race Officer (PRO) for this event. If that name sounds familiar, John was PRO for the incredible 34th America's Cup on San Francisco Bay last summer. He presented an America's Cup Update report at the Club on Tuesday, January 28th. The SRO audience was so keyed up to replay last September's incredible comeback by Oracle Team USA, they were applauding during John's introduction! His presentation was outstanding, with video clips from the summer and a peek ahead at what may be in store for AC 35 in 2017.

The Racing. Unfortunately, uncharacteristically light air for winter in Miami plagued the regatta. In five days of racing, only seven races were completed for each of the Men's and Women's Classes. Two races were sailed on Monday and Tuesday, none on Wednesday, three on Thursday, and again none on Friday. Saturday's Medal Races were greeted by the best breeze of the week, but still on the light side. Competitors and Race Committee alike spent a lot of time ashore that week waiting for breeze that sometimes materialized, but sometimes not.

Results. The US has seldom been strong in Olympic Windsurfer competition. Having been shut out of Medal finishes in sailing events at the 2012 London Olympics, the pressure is on for improved performance by US sailors. We still have a ways to go in the Boards. Top Men's USA finisher for this event was Carson Crane in 14th place – midfleet. He was followed consecutively by US sailors Jonathan Rudich and Raul Lopez. None qualified for the Medal Race. Internationally, it was quite competitive, with eight different countries finishing in the top eight.

Among the Women, the showing was a bit better with veteran Farrah Hall finishing 8<sup>th</sup> and making the Medal Race. US Women also finished 12<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>. Two Italian Women took second and third, but except for that, there were six countries represented in the top eight Women finishers.

CSGC Race Committee. Our Race Committee did another great job under difficult circumstances. Carl and Mercedes Updyke's 34 foot catamaran Cool Obsession was once again the Signal Boat for this event. Ron Rostorfer (PC) was John Craig's Deputy PRO. Dottie Rostorfer and Marvin Schenker shared Timer duties, and the rest of the Signal Boat crew comprised Saralee Lamb, Connie Bradley, Nancy Rogachenko, Suzanne Roberts, Veronic Aghayan and Jo Ann Mathieu.

To windward were David Kurtz's (PC) Robalo and RC Chair Susan Walcutt's Contender. Crews were Chuck Edelstein, Art Auwaerter, Jim Waldron, Marylinda Ramos and Karen Young.
