100 LASERS ON THE OCEAN!

Little 14 ft. Lasers like to race on the ocean! Hard to believe, but true. The end result was the 2015 Laser District 13 Championship on December 5-6. It was shore-based at the Historic Virginia Key Beach Park with racing on the ocean just beyond the Bear Cut Channel.

District 13 is pretty much the State of Florida, but 100 Lasers came to race from as far as Texas and even Canada, making it the largest District 13 Championship in at least the past three years. The event was the brain child of CGSC's James Liebl, a former Laser Master World Champion and active on the CGSC Race Committee. James was Chairman of the event, and put forth a huge effort to bring it about. CGSC's fantastic Regatta Shoreside Chair, Sandrine Quenee, did an incredible job at the Park handling registration, scoring and all the other shore-side aspects.

What a scene it was at the Park on Saturday

morning! Boats arriving and being rigged by excited sailors, vendor displays set up and coffee and breakfast breads available adjacent to the registration activities. The weather – well, it was there. A cold front had stalled over south Florida bringing rain and lots of uncertainty on the wind. Leading up to the weekend, the forecasts varied from 5 knots to 30 knot gusts. Reality was rain and NE-E winds in the high teens. The kind of wind for which they came to sail!

The CGSC Race Committee and the several coach boats helped make sure all boats safely navigated the Bear Cut Channel and out to the ocean. Racing got underway a bit after noon for three classes – Laser Full-Rigs, Radials and 4.7's. The Full-Rig fleet included the Laser Masters who were scored both overall and separately for Masters. There were 29 Full-Rigs, a whopping 46 Radials and 14 of the younger sailors in the 4.7 rigs.

REAR COMMODORE'S REPORT

s sailors we are aware of the necessity to communicate effectively. During a racing series communication it can mean the difference between a great start or being stalled in disturbed air. The race committee, through sounds and flags can communicate with the entire fleet. On board, the communication between skipper and crew can result in smiles or frowns depending on delivery and reception of information relevant to the leg. The delivery of this information can directly affect the receiver and their continued attention. While on the water this awareness of effective communication is shared by skippers and crews of the entire fleet and race committee. Unfortunately, the exchange of information is often forgotten or ignored while on land. Before we leave the dock some of our most important communication exchanges are abandoned. On a number of occasions I have been approached by a sailing member regarding another member or employee and what they felt should have occurred before they left the dock. My immediate response is almost always, "Did you speak to them directly and ask for assistance"? With a disappointing frequency the response to my query is a resounding "No, they should have". Communication is as varied as we are, but if



you need assistance, if you feel something should be done, if you see a potential problem, speak up. Go directly to the person and communicate, with civility, your needs or concerns. I have done this on many occasions and have been given space at the dock, or help launching my boat, and have assisted others when a potential problem may occur. Communication, try it, it works.

MEET NEW CGSC RACE MANAGER BLAKE MIDDLETON!

coconut Grove Sailing Club is going the way of professional regatta and race management for our busy winter regatta schedule by retaining the services of Blake Middleton. CGSC is fortunate to attract Blake's services, which will be on a seasonal basis. He is also Race Manager and Principal Race Officer at both Minnetonka and Wayzata Yacht Clubs on Lake Minnetonka near Minneapolis, Minnesota, and has served in those capacities since 1997. Consequently, he will be here in the December thru March winter months, and back in Minnesota during the rest of the year.

Blake has a very wide and deep resume of sailing, teaching, coaching, regatta and race management experience covering close to forty years. He has actively raced in several classes including Lasers, Snipes and J-24's. He attended and graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, and helped found the sailing team there. He then served as Commodore of the Midwest Collegiate Sailing Association, and was subsequently inducted into the U of W-Green Bay Phoenix Hall of Fame in 1995.

After graduation, Blake served as Assistant Sailing Coach at the US Naval Academy, and Head Sailing Coach/Director of Sailing at Stanford University for nine years in the late '80's-early '90's. He Chaired the

Intercollegiate Yacht Racing Association All-American Selection Committee during 1992-95. Blake is Certified by US Sailing as a Regional Race Officer. He could easily achieve National Race Officer Certification if he could find the time to "jump through the hoops!"

At CGSC, Blake will be sliding into the responsibilities currently held by Regatta Chair Ron Rostorfer (PC) and Race Committee Chair Susan Walcutt. Both Ron and Susan have served the Club in these positions for years, and are due to be replaced. Interestingly, Ron also served as Commodore of the Midwest Collegiate Sailing Association, but that was many years before Blake's duty! Small world!

Blake actually got a head start at CGSC during the 2014-15 winter regatta season. He was flown in to serve as Race Officer on the Gate Boat in early December for the CGSC hosted Melges 32 World Championships shore-based at Miami Beach Marina with racing on the ocean east of Bear Cut Bridge between Virginia Key and Key Biscayne. After that, he was at CGSC during January-March, 2015 as an introduction to our regatta program and Race Committee personnel. So, it'll be "hit the ground running" when he arrives December 1st! If you see Blake around the Club, please introduce yourself and help make him feel at home in his new winter digs.

What ensued was lots of great racing, along with a multitude of capsizes and near misses.

The wind was initially NE, but prior to the racing shifted closer to east. The Race Committee set a trapezoid course to help keep the fleets separated. By the end of the day, three races had been completed for each of the classes. The coaches did a huge job of standing by capsized boats and assisting where needed. In one case, the tired sailor and a coach traded boats, with the coach righting the Laser and sailing it to the Beach while the sailor brought the coach boat to shore.

Even with the rainy weather and breeze, happy Laser sailors gathered under one of the pavilions at the Park for a good hot catered dinner. The RC boats had commuted from the Club to Crandon Park Marina, and then out to the race area. It was just after dark by the time the last RC boat returned to the Club.

Sunday morning brought skies that were a tad clearer, but lots of easterly breeze. Forecasts indicated winds in the mid-20 knot range. The RC boats marshalled up at Crandon and the fleet was held ashore. RC Chair Susan Walcutt and her crew were dispatched to the race area on her Contender mark boat to assess conditions. They reported waves up to six feet in the Channel and a steep wave pattern in the race area which was worsening. So, considering the safety of all concerned, racing was abandoned for the day and

Saturday's results stood as final.

CGSC was verv well represented in the 4.7's. CGSC's Daniel O'Farril had three bullets in this fleet to win by five points. In the very competitive Radial fleet, Scott Rasmussen and Christina Sakellaris from Lauderdale YC took the 1-2 spots with Skylar Bayman from Houston YC in 3rd. In the Full-Rigs, CGSC's great Ernesto Rodriguez took second to young Max Guerriero from Texas Corinthian YC by one slim point. Ford McCann from Texas Corinthian was 3rd. Ernesto won the Masters in comfortable style.

CGSC's Race Committee did another great job on the water. Gary Ellis' Eagle Eye was Signal Boat with Principal Race Officer and CGSC Race Manager Blake Middleton, Suzanne Roberts, Esther DiLeo and Connie Bradley. Up to windward with Susan Walcutt were Race Officer Jaime Ramon, Dorian Goldberg and Sicotte Hamilton. The Pin Boat was skippered by Debbie Ryder with Race Officer Ron Rostorfer and Philippe Dusser. The Outer Gate/Finish Boat was Dave Frazier's Angler with Race Officer George Bradley, Julie Hanrahan, Saralee Lamb and Andi Hoffman. Ev Hoffman's Grady-White was the Safety/Course Patrol boat with Patrick McLister, Cathy Buller and Richard Etkin.

Assisting Sandrine on Shore-side were former Chairs Richard and Maryann Etkin, Joel Krieger, Colin & Michael Dorsey, Marlene Erven, Lisa Yakovenko and Bill Braddon.

And a final thanks to the Historic Virginia Key Beach Park and the Historic Virginia Key Beach Park Trust for allowing CGSC to host the regatta from the Park.

APPY NEW YEAR to All of our Members and Adult Sailing Students! 2015 was a year of expansion and growth for your adult instructional programs at CGSC. We are looking forward to an even more successful year in 2016, as we enter the new year with a strong core of dedicated, certified instructors that we also hope to expand and with the continued support of our officers, directors, membership and staff. We start off the month of January with a "bang" with all of our adult US Sailing Classes offered, including the Sunfish Learn-to-Sail, Basic Keelboat (2 classes), our Flying Scot options, Sunfish clinics, and we are especially pleased to announce another of the cruising series of classes, with Capt. Bruce Penrod conducting a BASIC CRUISING Class on January 8-9-10, and a BASIC BAREBOAT Class on January 22-23-24-25. Both classes include certification. The classes will be conducted on Bruce's yacht, 'Leaping Groundhog' pictured below. There are prerequisites for both classes. In November, thanks to the addition of our newest basic keelboat, "Jolly Roger", we proudly conducted our very first 4-boat, 12-student BASIC KEELBOAT Class, followed by another full 4-boat class on December 12-13 and even another December class on the 19th-20th. It hasn't been that long ago that we did not have December classes for Sunfish or keelboats, due to the holidays and not being able to generate enough interest for a class. We've come a long way, sailors.

For those new members, or anyone else interested in learning to sail, please remember that we offer twelve (12) Sunfish Learn-to-Sail classes, the first weekend of each month, twenty-two BASIC KEELBOAT Classes, twice monthly on the

second (2nd) weekend, and again on the third (3rd) weekend of each month except February and November, Flying Scot classes by appointment, and both cruising classes, scheduled to meet the demand of students becoming eligible through prerequisite certifications.
