

The regatta was christened by Karl's dad Joe, who came up with the name 'Halloween Howler' because of the October winds!

Registration at the 2016 event was a 101 percent increase from 2014!

Our 2016 brave youngest sailors just turned 6 in the Opti Green fleet, 9 for the Opti RWB fleet, and 12 for the Laser fleet.

327 young sailors have participated in the Howler since it began in 2011.

ADULT SAILING REPORT

Hello Sailors and Future Sailors. As I prepare this report, I am preparing for our Annual WORK WEEKEND. We always have a good turn-out to help us spruce up our adult training fleet of Sunfish, Ensigns and the Beneteau cruising fleet. We will also be preparing our newest keelboat training addition, JOLLY ROGER, for additional use in the Member-Use program fleet. You have probably seen this fine boat moored very near the end of our main dock. Donated by member, Dr. Steve Samson, it is a 24 full-keel cruiser sloop, very similar to the Ensign hull, but with a larger cabin and smaller cockpit. Like the Ensigns, the jib is hanked on. While it is not in a good position for our normal non-powered training boats, it will now sport an outboard engine for easy access to the bay and back to the mooring. The primary use of this vessel is still for adult training, however, there will be ample member-use access, even on selected weekends. A limited orientation will be offered to those desiring to use this vessel, once it is completely ready for use.

This has been a difficult sailing season for our training program as well as many recreational sailors. First it was El Nino, then the wettest winter on record in Florida, since 1905, then so many class weekends and private sessions being disrupted by too much wind, and occasionally, not enough wind. We hope as we enter the cooler seasons this year, that we will see an improvement in the weather. Thanks to all of you member students who have been so patient with our classes and private coaching during this challenging weather. Our recent weekend class attendance has slowed slightly due to some scheduling issues, but our private classes have been on a very definite increase. We have experienced numerous students, including complete families coming to us from numerous states for US Sailing instruction and Certification. In fact we have scheduled a complete family from Nevada to be with us over the holidays for the BASIC KEELBOAT class and certification, all the way through to our Cruising and Bareboat Classes with Capt.

Another BASIC CRUISING Class is scheduled for December 2-3-4, followed by a BASIC BAREBOAT Class on December 9-10-11-12.

REAR COMMODORE'S REPORT


Ello Sailors!
Summer is going and winter is coming. That means more wind, and "bird poop"on our boats. More wind is great. Take off that 150% foresail and hank on the 100%. Get out sailing and enjoy the breeze on Biscayne Bay. But before you do, what about that "bird poop"? Here's what I've seen over the years ...

If you are out on the mooring field you must put fishing line across the spreaders, and do something to keep the birds from sitting comfortably on your masthead, shrouds, and stays. An easy and popular tactic is to put strings of flags up on a halyard, over the boom, and anywhere else you can. It kinda works, but after a while the birds seem to get used to them. Same with hanging old CDs around. An effective but messy solution is to apply bird repellant (available at Home Depot, etc.) everywhere they might sit. It's nasty stuff, and the birds won't land on it. The down side is that it collects soot from the air, and after a year or two things look black (see Moon Glow's topping lift!). Several people, including the late Bill Beavers, have success with a wonky propeller on a stick at the top of the mast. The boat next to me has propellers all over the place, which is doing OK. The drawback is that you have to take them down

for sailing and put them up again afterwards. My most recent approach, which others have used and seems to work well, is a to put cable ties with the end sticking up everywhere they sit. They don't like to be tickled from behind, it seems.

Finally, if you really want to keep the birds off your boat, just put a bird feeder and a bowl of sugar water on the boat next to you :-)

Elsewhere in this issue there is an article about the very successful Halloween Howler Regatta. I won't repeat the news, but just



encourage you to read that article. Sue and her team did a great job! Work weekend will have come and gone by the time you read this, and I hope I will have seen many of you down there having some fun sprucing up the club. Then it's back to sailing the next weekend ... woooohooo!
