Last week Adolfo (of the dock staff) very enthusiastically showed me the Channel from August 1992 - the Channel after Hurricane Andrew. On page 21 he showed me the extract shown here. Look carefully ... yes, it's Moon Glow, which I now own! It had broken free and been deposited up on shore. Moon Glow was built in 1973, so she was a tender 19 years old when that happened. Moon Glow also survived Hurricanes Katrina and Wilma in 2005, when she was 32 (does anyone know who owned her then - I think Mike Weber?). Most recently she survived in the mangroves for Hurricane Irma last year, when she was 44 years old. Quite an exciting life for a boat! I'm sure that if someone had told Halsey Herreshoff (who designed the Bristol 30') back in 1973 that Moon Glow would go through so many hurricanes, he would have confidently replied "I doubt there is any weather that that this boat can't ride out".

I hope I am as hardy as Moon Glow, and can meet those kinds of tough challenges. It's been 13 years since I joined CGSC on 8th January 2005 as "Social Member #418". I'm sure that if someone had told me back in 2005 that one day Dave Martin would be calling me "El Jefe", I would have confidently replied "who the heck is Dave Martin?" I was "conscripted" into sailing



and the club by the famous Past Commodore Bill Beavers, to do foredeck on his boat Finesse (which is still on the mooring field). And here's a fun fact ... Bill also owned Moon Glow for quite a while, from 1979 to 1988. What floats around comes around!



Boat was on CGSC mooring before the storm. Preparation: reduce windage, tape to waterproof; anchored 1 mile south of the mole on two large Danforth anchors with 200 feet of rode.

Moonglow "rode out the storm all over Biscayne Bay!" It was found on land against a tree 150 yards from shore. Minor hull scratches, rudder and some rigging damage (caused by salvage effort). "We believe someone cast us adrift to use our anchors — no evidence of chafing or anchor lines were visible."

World Championship Coming in 2019!

It's been a long time since CGSC was founded back in 1946 – 72 years, actually. Finally, next year in 2019, CGSC will host a World Championship at the Club. The 2019 Melges 20 World Championship will be sailed from the Club next April 4-7. CGSC Historian Renny Young took a good look back, and could not find any prior World Championship sailed from CGSC. It will be an exciting time in the life of a great Sailing Club.

LIGHT, BUT GOOD FOR 2018 CGSC ANNUAL CRUISING REGATTA

20th. Our 2018 Annual One-Design Regatta had already been sailed September 29-30.

The wind forecast for the Cruising fleet on the 20th was dismal. Basically, unraceable light air all day long. With the first start scheduled for 1130, our RC announced a Postponement on the VHF at 1000 and displayed Flag AP from the CGSC flagpole.

Half-hour updates were provided until 1100, at which point the RC advised the fleet that no changes would be made until noon at the earliest. This gave the sailors a chance to take care of other things during that period.

Then, things began to change. The Sailflow forecast improved indicating a ESE thermal breeze would bring sailable conditions by early afternoon. The wind instruments on the Club roof indicated ESE 5 knots. At noon, the RC lowered the AP flag and announced to the fleet on the VHF. The RC and fleet came

together at the Cruising boat assembly area by 1300, and the first start sequence began at 1310. Three fleets were sailing - ORC 1 with five boats. ORC 2 with six, and three PHRF boats. The ORC fleets sailed to a long weather mark at 0.9 nm in the 5-6 knot breeze from around 150 deg. PHRF

boats sailed to a short mark at 0.7 nm. The light breeze had been moving significantly to the right earlier. However, during the first lap of the race, the breeze backed to 120 deg. and stabilized. So, the RC signaled a course change for the second lap of the windward-leeward. twice around course, and sent the fleet that way for the second lap.

There was quite a speed differential among the ORC 2 fleet which caused a bit of a wait between the first

SC's 2018 Annual Cruising Regatta/BBYRA and last boats to finish. In order to get more racing Cruising #2 was sailed on Saturday. October in, the RC sent ORC 1 on the same course for Race

> 2, but changed ORC 2 and PHRF to a one-lap windward leeward course. Spinnakers were full, the breeze was steady and the racing was good, albeit light - staying in the 6 knot range or a bit more.

Finally, a third race was signaled a one-lap windward-leeward course for all fleets. All boats were finished by about 1630. So, three good races were sailed and the fleet finished up at a reasonable time. CGSC's RC did its usual good job of race management.


In ORC 1, the overall winner was Relentless, with frequent winner Senera a point behind in second followed by Main Squeeze. All are from other clubs on the Bay. In ORC 2, the overall winner was Swift, sailed by CGSC's Dave Martin and Andi Hoffman. They were followed by Traveler and Maiden. The PHRF winner was Jason Long's Captain Winky. Very nice trophies were presented to the leading boats on

the lawn of the Club around 1800. It was a happy crowd that assembled for the ceremony.

Special thanks to Signal Boat owner Frank DeLaurier and his 36 foot power boat, Rio Rita. Ron Rostorfer PC served as PRO. The Signal Boat crew was comprised of Timer Dottie Rostorfer, Recorder Lovell Luparini and Flag Signaler Martha Ledesma



on her first RC outing. The Mark Boat was CGSC's Angler with Race Officer Julie Hanrahan and crew Liz Balbin and Bill Quesenberry. The Pin Boat was Skippered by RC Chair Susan Walcutt with crew Allen Cox. Many thanks to all for a successful event.





BIGGEST & BEST HALLOWEEN HOWLER!

n the last weekend of October, CGSC proudly ran a successful 8th Halloween Howler Regatta. This fast-growing youth sailing event attracted a record 181 entries, represented by four returning Florida clubs and four that were participating for the first time. The CGSC RC managed three different racing circles: Laser Radial and 4.7 (36 boats), Optimist Red White & Blue (76 boats) and Opti Green (69 boats).

This regatta has been known over the years for its howling winds and smashing rains, but this year, it started with a glassy Bay greeting the fleets Saturday morning. Fleets were postponed on shore while the Race Committees watched and waited until 1100 when both reports from RC boats on the Bay and forecasts showed improvement coming. The postponement flag came down at noon and the fleets and RC's headed out. There was good light air racing all afternoon, although a major windshift had to be dealt with.

On Sunday, the game was a totally different story, with

a 14-16 knot westerly breeze right from the get-go. It provided excellent racing conditions for the balance of the regatta. No races could be started after 1400 that day so the out-of-towners could head for home, but the early start allowed plenty of good racing. A highlight for the racers was a short foiling kiteboard demonstration race to welcome the new Olympic Sailing Class for the Paris Olympics in 2024. Team USA kiters Daniela Moroz (Gold Medal at the 2018 World Cup in Aarhus, Denmark) and Cameron Maramenides (4th at the 2018 Youth Olympic Games in Buenos Aires, Argentina). A huge thank you to the 65 volunteers who contributed time and energy to this 8th Halloween Howler, to the PROs, Steven Stollman (Opti Green), Ron Rostorfer and Carlos Beckman (Opti RWB), and James Liebl (Laser).

An immense thank you to our RC Chair, Susan Walcutt, for her dedication and incredible support to our youth regatta!
