## Let's Talk about Team Trials!

ur very own Daniel van Puffelen competed in the 2019 US Optimist Team Trails held at California Yacht Club on May 2 – 5. The results of the US Team Trials in this class determine young sailors' position on international teams, the US National Team, as well as the US Development Team. Daniel placed 2<sup>nd</sup> in Silver fleet, which is a huge accomplishment and from what I understand didn't come easy.

Today I'm sitting down with him for a Q & A session to find out all of the details of his experience.

Hello Daniel, on behalf of the Coconut Grove Sailing we'd like to give you a BIG Congratulations on your success this past weekend! I can't wait to hear the story. First, we will start off with some easy questions and then we will get to the hard ones.

How long have you been sailing?

I've been sailing for seven years; two years in

beginners and five years on the racing teams. I started sailing when I was five years old.

What made you want to sail?

I have always been a fan of the water. My brother, Alex also encouraged me to sail by watching videos. It's just natural for me to be on the water.

Mainly I love sailing as a sport and want to keep improving to become the best that I can be.

Tell me about the process of Team Trials. How did you get there?

In order to get invited to Team Trials you must qualify at one of a few qualifying events. I qualified at the St. Pete Valentine's Day Regatta on February 10th. The top 25% which would have been the first 60 boats qualified. I came in 35<sup>th</sup> place.

Did you do any special training in preparation?

Yes, I trained with Coach Osvaldo during Spring Break. I also practiced for 1 day to learn the Pacific water conditions. It's much different than Florida. Lots of dolphin and seals swimming with us. We were able to do some sightseeing and I watched a soccer match with my coach. Then, we ate at Lala's, Coach Hernan says it's the best Argentinean restaurant in LA.

You had a very successful regatta this past week. Tell us about it:

Well, I had a really bad start, I started off in 150<sup>th</sup> place. Coach Hernan, decided to change my strategy and instead of starting on the favorite side with all of the "dirty" air, I changed to the less favorite side. I had to do a little more sailing and

Staying focused. You have to stay focus and pay attention to everything that changes, like a wind shifts.

What drives you to keep getting on the water and competing?



tacks. But, once we changed tactics I was able to pass 53 boats on Day 1 and passed 32 more on Day 3.

I missed Gold Fleet by 3 spaces when I submarined my boat. By Day 4, I was excited because I started in 3<sup>rd</sup> place in Silver Fleet. While on the water, I kept the same strategy in which I got me 2<sup>nd</sup> place in Silver Fleet.

You have sailed in over 50 regattas. How did this regatta compare to the previous?

This was the hardest regatta because of the competition and the conditions. I was racing against some of the best Optimist sailors. The sea conditions were different; the wind speed, shifts, waves, swells, and current was something that I had to adjust to quickly.

How nervous were you at the start? Did it change by the last day?

I was a little nervous because I never sailed in those conditions and I was thinking about making the national and international teams.

I was definitely not nervous on the last day because I was doing very well overall.

How did it feel to get a 2<sup>nd</sup> Place trophy?

I was very happy. But, I knew I could have done better because my mistake cost me 10 boat positions. But, I was still very happy because I have a chance to get on the international team

and I also got a trophy. I'm now hoping for a place on the Development team.

What are your next goals?

To make European Championships. I will have to get top 10 overall at the next Team Trials.

I heard you recently had a birthday?

Yes, my 12<sup>th</sup> birthday was the day before I left for the regatta.

So, this was a pretty good birthday

present?

Yes! There are 70 positions to fill on the International Team, I'm 67<sup>th</sup> overall.

Coach Hernan has been coaching you for some time now. What would you like to say to him?

I love him a lot and knew he would be my favorite coach because he was always nice to me. Make it Happen! That's our slogan.


Daniel, as a Leader, what is the first thing that comes to your mind that you would like to tell your fellow teammates:
