At the time of this writing we have completed the restoration of services and equipment disrupted by the close call with Hurricane Dorian. We were very fortunate to have only minimal impacts from this very powerful storm. Based upon the lessons we learned from Hurricane Irma in 2017, our preparations for Dorian were more efficient and thorough; however there is still room for improvement. On several occasions we could have used more hands and we'll be developing some new programs in the near future to set up a more formal mechanism for the members to support the staff in preparations for future storms. More details on these programs will be forthcoming.

As we all know, our friends and neighbors in the Northern Bahamas were not as fortunate as us,

and bore the brunt of Dorian's Category 5-level winds. We've collaborated with Christ Episcopal Church here in The Grove to transport items our members have generously donated over to the affected areas as guickly as possible.



CGSC sailors have long enjoyed the beauty of the Abacos and the friendliness of our Bahamian neighbors, we are committed to doing all we can to help them in their time of great need. You'll be hearing more about these efforts in the future and I urge you to participate to the greatest extent possible.

For a storm that was originally forecast to be a tropical storm aiming at Miami, Dorian turned very nasty, becoming one of the strongest storms on record, and decimating the Northwest Bahamas. Our staff is to be thanked for their amazing efforts in securing the club against the potential storm and then getting the club back in action after the storm, not an easy task. There is nothing worse than waiting until the last possible minute then being unable to find safe haven. Dorian has provided us with a 'dry' run and now we should all review our hurricane plans to incorporate the apparent changes in safe haven opportunities. GO EARLY.

There is plenty of activity in the Atlantic this year so it's quite likely we'll have to go through storm prep again. Let's be ready.

Given the size of the club, the storm preparation effort involved



is massive, so anything you as a member can do to assist, volunteer, provide offsite storage etc is much appreciated, and necessary. By the time this Channel is published we will have carried out a post storm briefing, and will be putting out requests for volunteers etc, under various headings. Please sign up – the club is volunteer driven and very dependent on member involvement. It's also what makes us such a special club and community.

In the meantime- on a positive note- the weather has been spectacular and there's some great sailing out there. Go for it, it's why we're here after all... Regards

ADULT SAILING

August was a slow month for instruction with only one Basic Keelboat Class with a limited number of students and little private instruction as well. I guess the heat of summer makes potential students look to the cooler months. One private big boat class happened at the end of the month and yes that was the same weekend that Dorian threatened us. The student didn't want to cancel so we cautiously went ahead with it and it turned out to be a great experience for the student. Even as the storm made a jog to the north, we went to Elliot Key for a Saturday anchorage. It was quite strange with only one other boat on the anchorage but very peaceful. We had a great sail back and made it back to the club just in time to get the boat ready for the storm, which by then was predicted to be tropical winds of less than 30 knots. The students helped remove the bimini and jib and tie up the main. They thanked me for the opportunity to get to see how to storm prep a boat, kind of a Tom Sawyer moment.

Speaking of storm prep, I want to thank all that helped including a great effort, as usual, from the staff. We put the Beneteaus in slips at Dinner Key and decided to put the Ensigns behind Clarington Island but then moved them back to their moorings, sans sails, before the storm winds came. The Sunfish were put away and secured. Everything fared well and most were back in service only two or three days after the storm passed and raged further north.

As I write this, a full Basic Keelboat class was held the second weekend of the month and we're gearing up for another well attended class the third weekend of the month. We hope to keep things moving and have offered a discount of \$50 for both of the Basic Keelboat classes in October. If you have been thinking of taking this course, take advantage of that discount. Many happy families have returned to sail with us this Fall, which has started with over 120 sailors. We are beyond excited to share this with you as this forms part of a new era in CGSC Youth Sailing. Within one year we have:

Had 476 sailors over the summer

Helped 20 families sail thanks to our generous scholarship program

Hosted an internationally recognized regatta with participation from 5 countries and over 20 clubs/ organizations for the 2nd year in a row.

Hosted the first ever USODA Development Team practice in the Southeast Region, and having several of our sailors join it.

Begun the sailing season with more than 120 sailors Begun a pilot program for homeschooled children

Continued the STEM program into its second year and have added a 2nd coach

Aside from all the personal victories the kids and coaches achieve every day that they sail at CGSC. I am personally very proud of the coaching staff and would like to congratulate Coach Tony Mier for growing the Laser and Green Fleet programs to historic size (23 laser sailors!). This goes to show

that their dedication and instruction has struck a chord with their sailors who continue to sail here.

We would also like to congratulate our own Conor Kellett who recently traveled to Toronto, Canada and participated in the 2019 U21 Laser 4.7 World Championship. Conor ended 37th in silver fleet and in his own words "learned a lot about what it takes to campaign a Laser" and promised to "hit the gym more!". Conor has been sailing with us since 2015 and has gone through both the Learn to Sail Program and the Opti Racing program. We are very proud of Conor for representing CGSC abroad, and wish him luck as his Laser career continues. Check out some photos below of Conor and Coach Tony in Canada!
