There is always some form of sailing happening at the Club and we truly are blessed to have such a resource at our disposal.

As your new Rear Commodore, my push to integrate the sailing programs continues to gather steam. This month we will see the first ever "Get Off the Ball Rally" where we have nearly 50 boats registered to sail their boat off their mooring ball (or off the Strip) past a buoy a mile away showing their commitment to the Club and sailing in general. It has been a very rewarding experience. Richard Crisler and Alex Fox, as chairs of the Ensign fleet, were able to get their classes to participate in the event along with our Youth Director Alberto getting the kids involved and showing their mojo. Other forms of integration have been happening with the small boats. The Sunfish fleet has started to race with the Finns on the weekends while having on the water instruction from our esteemed coaches. If one ever had any interest in sailing small boats, CGSC is certainly the place to be.

Andi Hoffman is starting an adult laser program where the club will allow adult members to charter and use club lasers for a small fee. This is a great feat because the lasers have traditionally been used only for the youth sailors but we are broadening our

sights to include adults who want to improve their sailing skills or, if more advanced, test their skills against other members. This program is very new and not fully formed so stay tuned for news related to the Adult Laser program.



Our hope is that we can encourage local laser sailors to join the club and store their boats here as well as have a grass roots adult laser program of our own to develop a strong local fleet. We are very excited about these new opportunities for sailors!

The Race Committee, specifically our fantastic Susan Walcutt, has been extremely busy putting together the new calendar for the next season and they have agreed to start participating in the Flying Scot racing. This local race committee function provides a mechanism for future Race Committee members to hone their skills and develop as Principal Race Officers, Judges, or other officials if they so desire. Adult Sailing

uly 11-12 saw the first US Sailing BASIC KEELBOAT Course since the club shutdown this past March. Since we restarted operations, our emphasis has been on trying to make up the missing class parts, for those whose full class was interrupted and cancelled after only the first of two weekend days. That has yet to be fully accomplished, but we are now back on schedule with our BASIC KEELBOAT Classes which have sold out for July and August at this time. To comply with CDC, City of Miami and the Club restrictions, we have, of course, required masking and distancing, which has reduced our class size to only six (6) students from the usual nine (9) or larger. We have added personal microphone head-sets to allow greater distance between lecturer and students and other changes. The reduced class size and resultant unavailability of seats in current classes has resulted in consideration of adding another class on the fourth weekend of the month, if we can easily staff it. These are good issues and in line with our mission of the club and its dedicated adult instructors.

We are pleased to see our Sunfish activity on the increase and thank instructor Marc Pendaries for stepping up to help with our classes and clinics. Our adult Sunfish classes under the US Sailing format haven now been in effect for more than 25 years.

In other news, our Flying Scot activity is really impressive. If you are around the club, you can see it in action. Congratulations to that program and its leadership.

Finally, we continue to be in great need of a US Sailing Cruising and Bareboat Instructor, who must also be USCG licensed. We have an attractive, non-demanding program for the right person.
