seas (artistic license for exaggeration) we decided to unfurl the jib. As we finished griding in the sheet, a massive squall came through and ripped the sail into pieces as the waves sent our boat and tiny outboard on



a rollercoaster. With no GPS and no prior experience, we managed to find the channel and arrived at the Coconut Grove Sailing Club. With zero visibility through the storm we could not locate the mooring ball which was assigned to us (we would not have been able to pick it up regardless if we located it). With no place to go we landed at the main dock and were welcomed by s/v Drift, who would soon turn out to be some of our closest friends. I tell this story because the Columbus Day Regatta reminds me of this day and because it highlights what the CGSC is all about. A place to seek safe harbor and share your experiences with friends.
