
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COMMODORE'S REPORT

2021 MELGES 20 WORLDS AT CGSC

Once again, Coconut Grove Sailing Club hosted the great, but it was basically a tune-up event for the Melges 20 World Championship. This time is was the 2021 Worlds. This year's event was sailed during December 7-12, 2021, with all 18 competing boats shore-based at CGSC. More were entered, but as we understand it, at least two boats from Europe were stranded in their containers at the port and weren't available to sail. Our own "supply chain" issue, it would seem. This was CGSC's fourth World Championship Regatta dating back to the 2014 Melges 32 Worlds sailed in the ocean off Key Biscayne, and shore-based at Miami Beach Marina. A similar venue was used for the Melges 24 Worlds in 2016. Then, the 2019 Melges 20 Worlds were sailed from CGSC. The Melges 20 Class Rules state that the Worlds site alternates between North America and Europe every year. So, at their first opportunity to come back to CGSC in 2021, that's exactly what they did! This is the Melges 20's 13th season for their Miami Winter Series at CGSC. Another testament to our Club!

The Racing. CGSC hosted the Melges 20 North American Championship back in November. Sounds Worlds the following month. The NAs were a breezy event. Unfortunately, that was not the case for the Worlds. The event covered a practice day in which two races were sailed, followed by four days of the World Championship with 10 races sailed. At no time did the wind exceed 8-9 knots. That said, although it was a light air series, racing conditions were fair, and good competition ensued. Winds during the event were from the easterly quadrant, from NE to SE, but again, light in velocity. All races sailed were Course 4, upwind and back, twice around, with a leeward gate.









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The first two races were sailed on Thursday, December 9th. Winning the day was John Sommi aboard *Pineapple* Express with a 2-3, and a three point lead over Dan Thielman aboard Kuai. After that, Dan and crew put on a clinic for a runaway victory and the 2021 World Championship. On Day 2, they posted a 1-4-1 to take a lead they never relinquished. On Day 3, they scored a 1-2-7 for a 12 point lead going into the final day of racing on Sunday, December 12th. In the first race on Sunday, they finished 2nd. This gave them an unsurmountable lead and allowed them to retire from the final 10th Race with a comfortable win for the World Championship and a score of 26 points over the nine counting races, given the boats could drop their worst score during the event. It was an incredible performance. Dan's crew included wife, Rayleen, along with outstanding sailors Lucas Calabrese and Alec Anderson. Other than Dan, it was a competitive event. A score of 38 point could win the Worlds. Over nine races, that's equivalent to seven 4th places and two 5th places. A long way from 1st, 2nd or 3rd.

Ending up second with 39 points was Russian Bogatyrs sailed by Igor Rytov, a frequent podium finisher at our Melges 20 Winter Series events. It was a very narrow decision for third, with Harry Roepers' Honeybadger winning the tie-breaker with Rhonda Joyce's Grinning Streak, each having 49 points. The back story for Grinning Streak is that it was holed via being hit by a commercial power boat operator from Dinner Key Marina on Sunday before the Worlds. The boat was taken to an outstanding repair facility at Ft. Myers. It was finished late on Tuesday, the day before the Practice Day on Tuesday, December 7th. CGSC Vice Commodore Dave Martin left the Grove at 10 pm that evening, picked up the boat in Ft. Myers at 1 am Wednesday, and returned it to the Grove by 4 am. The boat sailed the Practice Races starting at 11 am that morning. That's dedication to sailboat racing!! Thank you, Dave!









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Shoreside. There was an active shoreside schedule for the Worlds. That started with a couple of days of measurement checks conducted at Shake-A-Leg where the boats launched. This was led by Chief Measurer David Sprague from Sail Canada with CGSC RC volunteers assisting. CGSC's Regatta Chair Andi Hoffman arranged for all 18 competitors from five countries to be shore-based at the Club during the event. There was an Opening Ceremony on Wednesday evening, a BBQ on Thursday, a keg and appetizers on Friday, a Cuban Pig Roast on Saturday, and Awards with a keg and apps at Shake-a-Leg (SALM) on Sunday.

CGSC Race Committee. Once again, we were fortunate to have US Sailing Certified National Race Officer Shannon Bush from Texas as our Principal Race Officer for this event. Her expertise and dedication to the sport are exemplary. In particular for this event, it conflicted with an Etchells Class event hosted up the street. She's and excellent Etchells competitor and owner, but ran our Worlds instead. She recruited

a skipper and her boat sailed in the Etchells without her. Joining Shannon on Marc Allen's Grand Banks 36 Signal Boat were Deputy Race Officer and Scorer Andi Hoffman, Timer Dottie Rostorfer, Flag Signalers Francisco Castillo and Charity Johnson, and Recorders Saralee Lamb and Marlene Ervin.

Up to windward on her Contender 27 was CSGC RC Chair Susan Walcutt, with Race Officer Vickie Matthews, Steve Herman and Kathy Gunst. Also up there was Mark Boat 2 with Steve Fuccillo, Race Officer Ian McClelland and Don Deresz. The Pin Boat crew was Race Officer Ron Rostorfer, with Line Sighter Helen Phillips, Recorder Martha Ledesma and Helm Allen Cox. The Gate/Finish boat was crewed by Race Officer Nancy Rogachenko, with Helm Rick Klein, and George and Connie Bradley. Special thanks to "Lunch Lady" Denise Schneider, and shoreside Registrar Jo Ann Mathieu. Also to Regatta Chair Andi Hoffman. She did a great job and received her own round of applause at the SALM Trophy Presentation on Sunday.

Flying Scots

The Scot race for this month was called due to light wind. So, I will report on the Saturday morning racing clinic. Twice per month we hold Saturday racing clinics. The purpose of these clinics is to introduce sailors to racing and increase the skill level of sailors who want to race. Thanks to great volunteers such as Obie Smith, Gary Schrodt, Luis Martinez, Oliver Buckwell, Ryan Alexander, Vince Curl, Andy Buys, Eileen Kross, Peter Houseworth and many others who volunteer their time. This program provides a low stress and fun way to learn about racing. I video the races with commentary and distribute them later. We also have a quick debrief on the veranda after racing.

The day starts at 10:00 getting the boats ready and in the water. The first race is at 11:30. We have 3 short races and are back in by 1:30 with the debrief finished by 2:00. This is all done with private funds. No club assets or money is used so there is a fee to race.

Come and join us and see what fun it is. The race dates are on the club calendar.

We have added the staff position of Adult Program Coordinator to increase our service, safety and accuracy in our programs. This is especially true right now as it regards the Sunfish and Basic Keelboat programs, which includes not only instruction, but member-use privileges as well. Already established and popular, our Adult BASIC KEELBOAT Classes are reserved full as much as two (2) months in advance. The pandemic bears some of that effect as individuals and families were looking for clean, safe outdoor activities. What could be better than sailing? During this past year, we have also added additional adult certified instructors, all of whom are staying busy and you will see activity at the club often seven (7) days a week.
