He is survived by his wife Carmen; his children, Gonzo, Augie and Ani; his grandchildren, Daniela, Veronica, Lucas, Gonzalo, Adrian, Anneli, Arturo and Augie; and his great grandchildren, Lucy, Henry, Alexa, Monica, Gonzalo, Gabriel, George and Hawkins.

A funeral service was held on Tuesday, March 7th 2023 at 1:30 PM at the St Augustine Catholic Church.



Melges 20 Tested by the Weather

en Melges 20s returned to the CGSC on February 10 to 12 for the 3rd of their four-part Winter Series. Mother Nature granted them good racing, with an assist from National Race Officer Shannon Bush and the CGSC Race Committee. The Signal Boat was John and Jan Sauvigne's luxurious "Adventure".

Day 1 featured medium SE breeze, with winds consistently between 150 and 160 degrees magnetic. Courses were Windward-Leeward with each leg slightly under a mile. After the day's three races, Peter Mclennen's Gamecock from the USA had a 5-point total, 2 points ahead of Vladimir Prosikhin's Nika from Monaco.

Day 2 again featured medium breeze, but this time the winds were shifty, varying from 160 to 185 magnetic, and the course was reset several times during the day. Nika had what would be its best day of the regatta, with two firsts and a 2nd place finish. After 6 races and one throw-out, Nika had the lead with 8 points, 1 point ahead of Gamecock and 4 points ahead of Daniel Thielman, a recent CGSC member. And then came Day 3. Westerly winds were very heavy and shifty, at one point moving quickly from 255 to 300 degrees. All 10 boats finished the first race of the day in winds just under 20 knots. The wind piped up, however, while the race committee was resetting the course for the last race of the day and the regatta. The race started and one boat retired immediately, as winds were 22 knots and gusting

higher. Nine boats made it to the windward mark, but one capsized and retired shortly thereafter. There was reportedly a gust that went up to 32 knots. Eight boats went through the leeward gate, but there was









another gust and another capsize and then there were 7 boats, all of whom finished the

race. For the day, Nika and Daniel Thielman's Kuai had two good races, but Gamecock had only one good race and fell to 3rd place overall.

2023 INDUCTEE INTO THE ENSIGN HALL OF FAME

Nomination as submitted by Doug Hanks of Fleet 8 Submitted by Zeke Durica, ECA Hall of Fame

Richard Crisler - The most documented instructor of sailing students on the Ensign

Richard, a 37-year member of Miami's Fleet 8 has the spectacular recognition of teaching more students on Ensigns than any other instructor of whom we are aware. He began teaching in the 1990s and was still teaching in 2022. The number of adult students he taught is close to 5,000. He has also helped arrange for the sale of several Ensigns to new sailors.

We wish Richard continued teaching success for many years to come.

In Miami, thousands of men and women have learned to sail at the tiller of a Pearson Ensign. And that's largely thanks to one Ensign owner, Richard Crisler.

In the 1990s and early 2000s, Richard was the lead instructor for Miami's Castle Harbor Sailing School. Owned by Cai Svendsen, the school maintained a fleet of Ensigns for Keelboat classes and was the source of almost all Ensign sailing on Biscayne Bay for years.

In 2004, the school switched to a different fleet and put its Ensigns up for sale. Richard arranged for an Ensign named Pat to find its way to the Coconut Grove Sailing Club. From that lone vessel, he launched the CGSC's U.S. Sailing Basic Keelboat instructional program, which is still going strong in 2022. The Sailing Club's longtime Adult Sailing chairman, Richard estimates 5,000 people have learned to sail on Ensigns under his direction.

Along with four CGSC Ensigns, Fleet 8 owes Richard for mentoring private Ensign owners at the Club, too. He helped arrange several Castle Harbor Ensigns to be sold to local sailors and has provided coaching and free advice as other CGSC members entered the world of Ensign ownership. For sure, Richard is the dean of Biscayne Bay's Fleet 8.

At 82, in a mask, he continued teaching Basic Keelboat through the COVID-19 pandemic, a main force for the CGSC classes not missing



too many beats. The year 2021 also marked a milestone for Richard: he retired as lead instructor and as the CGSC's Adult Sailing chairman. Which isn't to say he's done teaching. But this will finally give Richard some time sailing his own Ensign, Butterfly (Hull No. 1613), and the leeway for some cruising with the Ensign fleet he practically created on Biscayne Bay.

The Barnacle Society celebrates 136 years of racing on Biscayne Bay By Steve Herman

A

n excerpt from "The Commodore's Story" by Ralph Middleton Munroe.

"This spring of 1887 it was apparent the Bay could provide all the boats necessary for a yacht race, and it was decided to celebrate Washington's Birthday with an open regatta. There were fifteen responses to the notices issued, and every boat showed up and made a start, the fleet being divided into three classes. It was a success in every way, the winners being Ada, Captain Brickell, Maggie, Captain Carney, and Edna, Captain Addison, while Alfred Munroe and Charles Peacock were timekeepers and Judges. After the race all hands, about fifty in number, participated in a good dinner at Peacock's, given by the promoters. Thus, began organized aquatic sports on the Bay, the Washington's Birthday regatta afterward being a fixture of the Biscavne Yacht Club, until the displacement of sails by gasoline in general interest caused it to degenerate into a "chowder-party."

This year 2023 was the 27th time since 1997 that the Barnacle Society has celebrated the beginning of Biscayne Bay racing with a regatta featuring vessels of traditional design and rig: Mud Hens, Sea Pearls, Bullseyes, Sharpies, Bahama Dinghies, Cat Boats, Sloops, Gaff-Rigs etc. Coconut Grove Sailing Club was pleased to once again serve as the Race Committee for this great event.

There were sixteen responses to the notices issued, and every boat showed up and made a start, the fleet being divided into four classes (named Ibis, Egret, Sandpiper and Plover). It was a success in every way, the winners being Reprieve, Captain Carlos Salabaria, Ace of Hearts, Captain Oscar Kramer, Zena, Captain Skip Richheimer and Henrietta, Captain William Coleman, while Steve Herman and Stacy Morris were Principal and Deputy Race Officers. After the race all hands, about fifty in number, participated in an excellent chowder and awards party at Barnacle State Park, which also featured a costume contest, the traditional reading of the above excerpt, and many remembrances of boat designer, builder and sailor David Westphal who passed away in the previous year.

With the wind coming from the Southeast, the signal boat

(Tom September's "Belle Noire") was able to anchor close to the end of John A. Brennan Channel and Munroe Channel, not far from Middle Ground, for the 12:30PM start. Winds were initially light and the Race Committee set up a short Windward Leeward course for the faster Ibis and Egret fleets, and a short triangle course for the Sandpiper and Plover fleets. The 8 boats doing the triangle course included 3 Hens, 2 Catboats, a Cape Dory Typhoon and the beloved Egret (a Munroe Sharpie). Winds clocked about 45 degrees to the South and the boats took 25 to 45 minutes to get around the short courses in 2 to 4 knots of wind. At about 1:30 pm the windows strengthened to about 8 knots for the second race and then backed to SouthEast for the third race, so all fleets had at least two good races and were finished by 2:45pm. It was a beautiful sight when all the boats were on the course. A good time seemed to have been had by all. The Race Committee was outfitted in a costume of black pants, white shirt, suspenders, ribbon ties and old-timey hats, courtesy of Barnacle State Park. In addition to names already mentioned, the Race Committee included Jo Ann Mathieu and Louise McKee on Signal, Allen Cox, Bill Becker, Jurgen Tientze and photographer Susan Mohorcic on Mark Boat, and Bob Deresz and Fred Grote on a support boat. The event, which went very smoothly, would not have been possible without the Barnacle Regatta Committee headed by Barnacle Society President John Palenchar, 1st Vice-President Amy Exum, Ranger Jessica Cabral, PRO ex-

officio Nancy Rogachenko, and the support of many others.
