As the club gets slightly less busy, now is the time to get that sailing certification you've been wanting or, to get on that Flying Scot you've been wanting to try! We have a lot of members and a lot of members who do not have boats. And every month I talk to a ton of folks who would simply love to be on the water especially as the weather heats up. So why not contact our staff and get yourself in a learn to sail program? We've got the Ensign program that will get you started and we also have the Flying Scot program to get you going and out on the water.

The Ensign program has a few different angles to it. First off, we are a USSailing accredited educational facility with qualified instructors who will get you certified to take out a keel boat. Once certified, you can then use our Ensigns when they are not allocated to classes. This is a very inexpensive way to get some skills and get on the water. Contact the dock staff and they can point you in the right direction.

If the keel boats are not your thing you still have options. Meet near the cranes on Wednesday

nights and find our fleet captain Bud Price. Bud will get you on a Flying Scot for the night free of charge and introduce you to the largest racing fleet on Biscayne Bay in a boat called a Flying Scot. The Flying Scot is a 19' centerboard boat that has a jib and a main as well

as a spinnaker. The Wednesday night gang practices between 5pm and 7pm and they have a great time racing and learning the boat.

If the Ensign and the Scot are not your thing, try your hand at a Sunfish or a Laser! The club has a handful of





these boats for use by the members as long as you get checked out. Again, contact the dock staff to learn more about these options.

There is really no excuse for you not to be out on the water especially in the upcoming summer months when the weather is warm

and so is the water! See you on the water! Dave


This is a serious matter and so I ask you not to dismiss this topic. Cars have been damaged and children put at risk. So, as mentioned,

2023 J/70 Midwinter Championship March 23 - 25, 2023

The J/70 Midwinter Championship in Miami, FL proved to be a roller coaster ride for the full nine-race series. The top finishers kept changing, and even the more consistent teams all had a couple double-digit scores or penalties. The team who outlasted the others and therefore crowned 2023 Midwinter Champion is: Savasana, led by Brian Keane, with crew Thomas Barrows, Conner Harding and Ron Weed. Three more idyllic races went in the books Sunday on Biscayne Bay. Keane, locked in a three-way tie for third heading into the final day, controlled their own destiny by racking up a 5,2,1 to close with 47 net points. Bryce Kalow's Superior 2 compiled a steady series for second place with 55 points. Charlie Thompson and Thomas Mallindine on Brutus III won two races and were always in the hunt, ending in third place with 68 points.

Topping the all-amateur division was team Dime with Andrew Loe, Mallory Loe, Spencer Kunath and Chris Roberts. In the runner-up position is Zachary Segal's USA 1154, followed by Henry Filter's Wild Child. The

Eker group from Turkey prevailed in the One-Pro Division with Ahmet Eker, Burak Zengin, Doga Aribas and Ates Cinar. Convergence secured the Mixed+ Division with an all-female team of Ava Wilson, Giulia Conti, Sarah Stone, Megan Gimple and Annie Longo. Savasana is on the heels of winning the recent Bacardi Cup in Miami as well as the Davis Island Winter Series in Tampa. Thomas Barrows summarized, "The fleet was really deep here, so unless you had a good start, you'd find yourself in the back really quickly. Brian, Ron and I have sailed together for 9-10 years, so when things are going well, we catalogue that. When things aren't, we troubleshoot on the fly. The teamwork is really good."
