


VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT

Wenty-seven I-420's came to CGSC on January 13th to 15th for the North American Championship. PRO Rick Myers led the CGSC race committee in delivering a solid and enjoyable event.

On Friday the fleet raced under clouds and a threat of rain (that never came). Winds were southeast and steady at 8 to 12 knots, although it felt like more. Boats were racing on a trapezoid course for the full weekend, and on Saturday we used the inner trapezoid (upwind leg, downwind to a gate in front of the signal boat, upwind leg, reach down to an outside mark, and then downwind to a waiting finish boat). We got in 4 of our planned 9 races on Friday.

Saturday brought more clouds, but still no rain. Northeast winds were 12 to 15 knots, the heaviest of the weekend, so per class rules the sailors were allowed to "ooch" (i.e. use body movements to propel the boat faster). An outside trapezoid was sailed on day 2 (upwing leg, reach down to an outside mark, downwind to a gate far to the left of the signal boat, upwind leg, and downwind to the waiting finish boat). Three races were run. Two left for Sunday.

And Sunday was a gorgeous sunny day. Winds were moderate from 120 to 135 degrees and we raced our last two races without problem.

Sunday's forecast was for a major storm front to pass through at noon, with high winds, lightning, and tornado warnings. The three other racing fleets on the Bay had all

cancelled before us. The fleet proceeded to do awards.

Per Rasco tradition, we all sang "La Bomba" while the eight winners (one at a time) chugged from the victory bowl and sang back to us. In deference to the early hour, Sprite was substituted for alcohol. Our PRO said "That was the most fun awards ceremony I've been to in a very long time!"

Bacardi Invitational #2

The Coconut Grove Sailing Club ran all of the racing for the Bacardi Winter Invitational #2 on January 26 – 28, 2024. "Chamber of Commerce" conditions, in a variety of winds, were enjoyed by the 35 J/70's and 21 Melges 24s who were racing. Bacardi was the main (but far from only) sponsor, so the racers also enjoyed an open bar every night of the regatta at Shake-a-Leg Miami, which was Regatta Headquarters. Principal Race Officer Mark Foster led the CGSC Race Committee, who garnered many compliments for our professionalism and for the quality of the races.

DAY 1: The first day saw light ESE winds between 8 and 10 knots, varying from 105 to 110 degrees. We got in the scheduled 3 races. In the J/70 fleet, Catapult jumped out to an early lead by winning the first two races. Melgina was leading the Melges 24's at the end of day 1 with a total of 9 points.

DAY 2: It all changed on day 2. Winds were the heaviest of the regatta, blowing between 12 and 17 knots and 140 to 165 degrees. Boats that did well in light air on Day 1 tended to do less well on Day 2. In the J/70 fleet, Brutus III carried the day, with two 1st place and one 2nd place finish. Everybody earned a throwout because we had done 6 races, and after their worst score was discarded, Brutus III was leading Catapult by a single point. In the other fleet, Kingspoke took over 1st place thanks to a very consistent performance: they were in the top 5 for

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each of the first 6 races.

DAY 3: Winds were intermediate at 9 to 12 knots, but it felt windier. For the first two races, winds were between 230 and 235 degrees, and because current was lined up with the wind, boats had a fast upwind time and a relatively slow downwind time. As the final race of the regatta was about to start, the wind swung right by 45 degrees, going to 280 degrees. There was not enough time to reset the course and start both fleets before the 2pm drop dead time, so the regatta ended after 8 races.

In the Melges 24 Fleet, Kingspoke had another two consistent races, and finished in first place, 13 points ahead of 2nd place. In the J/70 fleet, Brutus III outperformed Catapult and was leading by a few points. But it was not over yet. Going downwind on leg 2 of







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the final race, Brutus III and Catapult were overlapped on the same tack and had a small collision. Brutus III filed a protest against Catapult, and Catapult filed a protest against Brutus III. Whichever boat was at fault would be disqualified for the race and finish in 2nd place, with the other boat winning the Regatta. The Jury heard evidence, deliberated, and decided that Catapult had right of way and Brutus III was disqualified.
